The House of Representatives assembled in its chamber at 12:00 noon.

Member Gail Griffin of District 19, the oldest Member-elect in point of age, presided as Chairman Pro Tempore.

Chairman Pro Tempore Griffin appointed Chuck Fitzgerald as temporary Sergeant at Arms.

The Honorable Robert Brutinel, Chief Justice of the Arizona Supreme Court administered the Oath of Office to the Members-elect as follows:

I do solemnly swear that I will support the Constitution of the United States of America and the Constitution and laws of the State of Arizona: that I will bear true faith and allegiance to the same, and defend them against all enemies, foreign and domestic, and that I will faithfully and impartially discharge the duties of the office of State Representative according to the best of my ability, so help me God.

The Honorable Robert Brutinel, Chief Justice of the Arizona Supreme Court congratulated the members.

Chairman Pro Tempore Griffin thanked the The Honorable Robert Brutinel, Chief Justice of the Arizona Supreme Court.

RULES OF THE HOUSE

Chairman Pro Tempore Griffin announced that, without objection, the Rules of the Fifty-fifth Legislature would be adopted as the temporary Rules of the Fifty-sixth Legislature.

Chairman Pro Tempore Griffin announced that, without objection, Members' guests would be granted privileges of the Floor.

Chairman Pro Tempore Griffin announced that the Chair would now receive nominations for Speaker of the House.

Member Biasiucci placed in nomination for Speaker of the House of Representatives, Fifty-sixth Legislature, the name of Ben Toma of District 27.

Member Cano seconded the nomination of Ben Toma as Speaker of the House of Representatives and moved the nominations be closed and that Ben Toma be elected by acclamation as Speaker of the House of Representatives, Fifty-sixth Legislature. Carried.

Chairman Pro Tempore Griffin announced that Member Ben Toma of District 27 had been elected Speaker of the House of Representatives, Fifty-sixth Legislature and would be escorted to the Chair by Representatives Bliss, Cano, Chaplik, Lupe Contreras and Payne.

Chairman Pro Tempore Griffin congratulated Speaker Toma and presented the gavel to him.

The House was called to order at 12:35 p.m., Speaker Ben Toma presiding.

PERSONAL PRIVILEGE

Speaker Toma addressed the House as follows:

I'm sure you would all like a really long speech, but I'm not going to do that to you.

First of all, good afternoon and as has been obvious at this point, I am Speaker Ben Toma, and I would like to welcome you all to the Arizona House of Representatives Opening Day of the First Regular Session of the Fifty-sixth Legislature.

Before I introduce our guest speaker and we start the introduction of guests, I would like to take this opportunity to address my colleagues. First of all, it is a true privilege to be entrusted by you to serve as Speaker of the House because of the respect I have for this institution, especially its members and staff and the process that governs us. It's our job, and I don't take it lightly. I will listen to you; I will respect you; and I will make decisions that are guided by what I believe is in the best interest of this institution and the state. My request for all of you is to do the same. We're going to have, at times, profoundly different and competing ideas on how to improve Arizona. The debate will be, at times, be heated, precisely because we all care deeply about how this state runs and its policies.

The institution, however, this institution is specifically designed to settle opposing views about what is in the best interest of our great state. None of us, myself included, will always get what we want.

However, I'm confident that if we respect each other, and trust our legislative process, the House will do its job and we will have a productive and effective session.

So, thank you, I'm looking forward to it.

Speaker Toma welcomed and introduced guest speaker, Hanna Zach Miley, Author, Holocaust survivor. The introduction was followed by the viewing of a brief video about Hanna Zach Miley's story.

Hanna Zach Miley addressed the House as follows:

Thank you, Mr. Speaker. And thank you, esteemed members of the House of Representatives, dignitaries and guests.

It is an honor for me to address you on this special day, a day of fresh beginnings.

I think God must have a sense of humor!

Today there is no famous person, no young, virile sports celebrity or acclaimed musician to give this speech, only a small 90-year-old woman!

And then I think of Polly Rosenbaum. She was born in 1899 and died in 2003 at the age of 104. She sat in this room for 46 years.

While on a tour of this House, I noticed the portraits and sculptures honoring past members. I stopped and took a long look at the sculpture of Polly Rosenbaum, and I was inspired by her kindness and the strength of her character.

So why did Speaker Toma ask me to come here today?

I was born in Germany, in 1932, and that was an unfortunate time, I was 11 months old when Hitler seized power. An only child, I lived with my parents in Gemünd, a small, idyllic town between the Rhine and the Belgian border. We were Jews.

Gradually, slowly, our sense of security faltered.

In my mind's eye, even today, I can still see my first schoolbooks. For arithmetic we added, subtracted and multiplied bright, colorful flowers, balls and tops. Suddenly, one day we had new books with different pictures. Now we counted guns, tanks, helmets, and marching soldiers, in dull colors, in camouflage.

I vividly remember a hot summer day, walking between my parents in the hills above town. We stopped and looked down at the new swimming pool, glittering in the sun, we heard people laughing, splashing and swimming.

I looked up to my father, and I said, "I want to go there."

His expression changed and he quietly and sadly repeated the words written at the entrance, "No Jews allowed."

Like nearly all the Jewish community in Gemünd, my parents hoped that the madness wouldn't last.

Until Kristallnacht... the night of November 9th and 10th, 1938, when hate filled words became violent acts, when our synagogue was destroyed by fire, like synagogues all over Germany.

In a strange way, that night saved my life. By then my parents were not allowed to leave Germany but my father, galvanized by the violence, and he found a place for me on the Kindertransport. A rescue effort to bring Jewish children from Germany, Poland, Czechoslovakia and Austria to Britain.

Almost 10,000 children were saved, and I was number 8814. I left in the evening, of July 24, 1939, only 5 weeks before World War II broke out.

I was 7 years old when I arrived in Britain, losing my language, my culture, bereft of my parents, their protection and love.

I tried to fit in and become a "nice English girl" and block out my early life, but by the time I was a young adult, I became aware that inside there seethed anger, bitterness, unacknowledged loss and loneliness.

I could no longer suppress my past, my sense of injustice, my hatred for Germany and Germans.

It was when I reached the end of my rope that I had an unexpected, life changing encounter. A light penetrated my inner darkness.

For the first time since my childhood, I heard that I was not alone.

In that vivid experience, that unforgettable exchange when I could open my heart and face the turmoil within and give my own wrongness, my despair and also the wrongs that had been done to me, my Heavenly Father, I sensed Him saying, "Come to me, bring these intolerable burdens to me and find rest for your soul."

I still remember the lifting of that dark weight as I gave it all to Him.

And today, right now, as I share this memory with you, I marvel at the consequences, the fallout from that personal encounter, all those years ago.

But you know, it is one thing to make an internal transaction and to taste inner release and freedom following a conscious decision to forgive while living in a quiet English town miles away from the past and all that bitterness toward Germany and Germans.

The question is, does it hold? Is it real? Is it real when you meet face to face with the direct descendant of a Nazi?

Verena is the daughter of a Nazi.

Her father was part of the Austrian political leadership welcoming Hitler when he marched into Austria on the 13th of March, 1938. After the war, her father was convicted and imprisoned as a Nazi.

Verena was a baby at the time; she grew to love her father; he was a cultured, gifted man. When she learned of her father's complicity with evil, a struggle began within her. There was a tension between loyalty and shame and even affected her physical health.

Verena, like me, came to the end of herself. She was the daughter of a Nazi.

I was the daughter of Jewish parents who were gassed in the Holocaust. And yet, we share similar stories. We followed the same path in our common experience of healing, forgiveness and freedom.

On Monday, May 3, 2010, Verena and I were close together with eight friends before a locked iron gate in a small Polish village, Chelmno, peering through metal bars at the scrubby, barren ground, the place where a grey gas van had been parked.

We are there on the anniversary of the day my parents took their last breath, packed together with other Jewish bodies in such a gas van on May 3, 1942.

Suddenly I become aware...Verena has slid to her knees and is quietly weeping. I join her on the stony, dusty ground, and we embrace, mingling sorrow, repentance and forgiveness. I marvel at the levels of healing we both experienced, the child of a victimizer and the child of victims, drawn together by our Heavenly Father.

Last October, we met again, Verena and I. This time in the Jewish cemetery in Gemünd, Germany. My hometown for the first 7 years of my life and where George my husband and I had erected a memorial stone to my parents.

We were in Germany to film a documentary, telling my personal story of the Holocaust as a message of hope...and a warning.

We embraced and shared heart to heart and looked back in wonder at our journey together into reconciliation. We recounted the times we had shared the truth about our history. Verena recalled her sorrow and her request for forgiveness for her father's role in the genocide of my people there in Chelmno, and I remembered my response: to forgive-something totally beyond my natural ability. Surely a gift from Heaven, this release and freedom we experienced together.

And so back to the present, here in a place that echoes with words spoken and decisions made over so many years, votes cast that affected the everyday lives, the hopes, of our neighbors.

Words and decisions that reveal to a watching world the state of our union...who we are in Arizona.

So, what motivated me to say 'yes' when the Speaker invited me to be here today?

A twofold answer...

I deeply respect the role you play in the future of our State, and I believe each of us in the privacy of our own hearts aspires to leave the world a better place.

And I bring both warning and hope....

Because of my personal and family experience of the Holocaust, I watch with concern the rise of hostility and cruelty throughout the world, and I long for my home state, Arizona, and this House to be a light in this present darkness.

Thank you for the great privilege of honoring my parents and sharing my redemptive story with you, on this historic day in this place.

I would like to end with an ancient Jewish prayer, calling for blessing on your lives and the work you will do.

The Lord blesses you and keep you. The Lord make His face shine upon you and be gracious to you.

May he lift up His countenance upon you and give you peace.

C. Each Standing Committee shall adopt and file with the Chief Clerk's Office rules of procedure consistent with the Rules of the House and shall include the following:

1. With the exception of executive sessions ordered by a majority of the committee constituting a quorum, all committee meetings shall be open to the other members of the Legislature, the press and public so long as proper decorum is maintained.

2. All committees shall meet at regularly scheduled times and places unless cancelled with the permission of the Speaker. In the absence of the chairman, the vice chairman shall preside. In the absence of both the chairman and vice chairman, some other committee member designated by the Speaker shall preside.

3. The committee chairman (presiding officer) other than the chairman of the Committee on Rules shall prepare an agenda and distribute copies to committee members, the Information Desk and the Chief Clerk's Office by 5:00 p.m. at least five days before the committee meeting. Absence of a bill, memorial or resolution from the committee agenda will prohibit its consideration unless unanimous consent of all committee members is obtained. Unless a reconsideration motion has been offered and failed, a chairman may place a measure that failed in committee on any subsequent agenda.

4. A bill MEASURE not on the committee agenda shall be scheduled for discussion at the next subsequent committee meeting by presentation of a petition containing the signatures of two-thirds or more of the committee members.

5. A roll call vote shall be taken in each standing committee when final action on any bill MEASURE is voted.

6. Written committee reports shall be filed with the Chief Clerk's Office within a reasonable time but no later than two weeks from time of completion of meetings. A recording of the meeting shall be made available for public inspection three working days after the meeting. Attendance records of all committee meetings shall be filed with the Chief Clerk's Office within 24 hours from time of completion of meetings.

7. Special meetings may be called by the chairman but require permission of the Speaker and notice to members and the general public at the Information Desk by 5:00 p.m. on the previous day, except that the notice of a special meeting of the Committee on Rules may be given in open session prior to the meeting and does not require the Speaker's permission.

D. The Speaker is authorized to call meetings of standing and select committees of the House during periods when the House is not in session and to approve claims for travel and subsistence incurred by members of such committees in attendance thereon, as provided by law. Notwithstanding the statutory authority, the Speaker, after consultation with the committee chairman, may appoint members to the committee of reference.

E. No committee other than the Committee on Rules shall meet while the House is meeting in session without special permission of the Speaker.

F. Except as provided herein, all House bills MEASURES shall be considered by committees prior to the Saturday of the week in which the sixtieth day from the beginning of each regular session falls and all Senate bills shall be considered by committees prior to the Saturday of the week in which the ninetieth day from the beginning of each regular session falls. No committee except the Rules Committee shall consider a bill MEASURE in violation of this subsection without the written permission of the Speaker.

G. Notwithstanding Rule 8 \$ (T), no proposed amendment in the Committee on Rules to strike everything after the enacting clause and insert new material shall be in order.

H. ALL INTERIM COMMITTEE MEETINGS SHALL BE OPEN TO THE OTHER MEMBERS OF THE LEGISLATURE, THE PRESS AND PUBLIC SO LONG AS PROPER DECORUM IS MAINTAINED, WITH THE EXCEPTION OF EXECUTIVE SESSIONS ORDERED BY A MAJORITY OF THE COMMITTEE CONSTITUTING A QUORUM.

Motion by Member Biasiucci that the temporary Rules of the Fifty-sixth Legislature, as amended, be adopted as the Rules of the Fifty-sixth Legislature. Carried.

The Joint Session of the First Regular Session of the Fifty-sixth Legislature was called to order by Senator Warren Petersen, President of the Senate, at 2:10 p.m.

The Joint Organization Committee, consisting of Senators Alston, Bennett, Hatathlie and Hoffman and Representatives Grantham, Melody Hernandez, Livingston, Pingerelli and Quiñonez returned escorting Her Excellency, Katie Hobbs, Governor of the State of Arizona.

Governor Katie Hobbs, who was introduced by President Warren Petersen, delivered the following message:

STATE OF THE STATE GOVERNOR KATIE HOBBS FIRST REGULAR SESSION, FIFTY-SIXTH LEGISLATURE JANUARY 9, 2023

Chief Justice Brutinel, Secretary Fontes, Attorney General Mayes, Treasurer Yee, Superintendent Horne, Mine Inspector Marsh, Speaker Toma, President Petersen, Leaders Terán and Cano, members of the Legislature, Supreme Court, and Corporation Commission, tribal leaders, honored guests, and Arizonans in every corner of our state, it is an honor to join you here today.

We gather every year for this annual tradition, but before we begin, I would like to take a moment to honor a man who lived his life in service to this state. Mel Hannah, who served as the chair of the Secretary of State's Community Advisory Council during my tenure and a member of the Commission of African American Affairs, passed away last night. His family and friends are in my heart and prayers today.

Companies have record job openings, but far too many Arizona residents can't afford rapidly increasing rents or have been priced out of buying a home.

We have some of the best K-12 schools in the country – but the state has long failed to live up to its obligation to adequately invest fairly in public education in every community, and we see the results of that with high teacher vacancy rates and some districts with crumbling infrastructure.

Arizona has stunning landscapes and unrivaled natural beauty. However, we must do more to protect our forests and watersheds from the devastating effects of fire and drought.

Our state has a dedicated public sector workforce. But we can do better in reflecting the diversity of our state to better serve our communities. Those who work in public service should feel empowered, and it is our responsibility to ensure barriers to accessibility and opportunities are broken down for all.

As we look to the future, we cannot continue to kick the can down the road on these issues and many others. We owe it to our fellow Arizonans – both this generation and the next—to face these challenges head on.

As I said in my inaugural address, I'm an optimist—especially when it comes to Arizona. I believe we are the greatest state in this nation. I believe in our educators and our students. I believe in the men and women who protect our public safety every day. I believe in our innovators, risk takers, and entrepreneurs. I believe in our public servants. I believe in the future of our incredible state – and I know you do too.

In the late Governor Rose Mofford's 1989 State of the State address, she spoke about "difficult choices" as she challenged the legislature to do the right thing – funding elementary and high school education, supporting our state's health care system AHCCCS, and other critical challenges of her time.

No one should be surprised that Governor Mofford fought for the right thing and chose not to back down from those challenges. She had a deep understanding of what the people of Arizona wanted and what they needed. As a Democratic governor working with Republican lawmakers, she knew when to find bipartisan compromise and when to stand firm in her beliefs.

As we begin to write this new chapter for the state we all love, I ask that we all take inspiration from Governor Mofford's actions and look toward the future... to the partnerships we will forge...to the challenges we will overcome together ...to the good we will do for our fellow Arizonans.

My hope is that when you leave here today, you understand that I and my administration are committed to action and to improving the lives of every Arizonan. And if you are committed to those same ideals, then I am ready to work side-by-side with you—no matter your party registration.

With that, here are my priorities as we build a resilient, innovative and prosperous Arizona for everyone.

Education gave me a chance to climb my way up and build a better life. I know that's true for countless other Arizonans and for many in this chamber today. That's why I have spent so much of my public life fighting for better schools and to level the playing field—and that's exactly what I'll continue to do as governor.

However, before we talk about steps we will take to improve K-12 education going forward, we must first address the potential catastrophe that will happen in just a few months if the legislature does not act to address the archaic funding cap—officially known as the Aggregate Expenditure Limit—by March first.

As part of last year's budget negotiations, a promise was made that a special session would be called to override this limit that's based on an out-of-date, 40-year-old funding formula that's holding our public schools hostage.

That promise was not kept.

We must make this right. If we do not, this ticking time bomb will explode and force a 1.3 billion dollar cut that would be one of the largest in our state's history.

And it will happen in the last two months of the school year.

Superintendents and education leaders are warning this will cause furloughs, layoffs, and possibly even school closures. It is unnecessary to allow these hysterics to go on any longer. Let's give our students, our teachers, and our parents the assurance that schools will remain open.

The solution is simple and it doesn't cost another penny to do the right thing. Representative David Cook has already introduced a resolution to override this outdated limit. This legislature should bring it to the floor. The Democrats in both chambers stand ready to act on this immediately.

Looking beyond this pressing issue, Arizonans have made clear it's time to rebuild and reinvest in our public schools. For years, our leaders have chosen to ignore parents, teachers and students who know we can have the greatest public education system in the nation—but instead are too often saddled with crumbling infrastructure and crowded classrooms.

And rather than doing the right thing and facing these challenges head on, the previous legislature passed a massive expansion of school vouchers that lacks accountability and will likely bankrupt the state.

In fact, funding this expansion is poised to cost Arizona taxpayers an estimated 1.5 billion dollars over the next 10 years if left unaddressed.

That's why when my budget is delivered on Friday, you will see that it truly invests in public schools and students—ensuring we are a Prepared Arizona.

We will begin with our public school teachers, who continue to be caught in the middle of crises of our own making—and for thousands of them, it's too much. One in four teachers leave Arizona schools each year, which is the highest rate in the nation. As a result, more than 2,500 classroom educator positions are vacant.

As the sister of two public school teachers, I see how hard they work every day on behalf of their students. So to the teachers and education support professionals of our state, I see you, I respect you, and I will always stand up for you.

To members of this legislature, I hope we can all agree that when we keep the most talented teachers in the classroom, our kids win, our families win, and our communities win.

That's why I will be launching an Educator Retention Task Force to develop a thorough framework and make recommendations to improve class sizes, resources, working conditions, and other factors that will put us on a path to fix these issues and retain educators.

The reality is we don't have an educator shortage, what we have is a retention crisis. There are too many amazing professionals who have walked away from the career they love because of the uncompetitive salaries, onerous policies, and unfunded mandates this state has chosen to implement that rob educators of the joy of teaching. Teachers are creating the workforce and leaders of tomorrow, and it's time we started treating them with the respect they deserve.

For the last 5 years, Arizona has been involved in a lawsuit about school facilities funding. Last week, with support from Attorney General Mayes, my office led the successful effort to put the brakes on a costly and wasteful trial scheduled to start today—so we can focus on solving problems instead of needlessly paying lawyers millions to fight in court.

With the release of my budget on Friday, you will see historic investment in schools to address capital needs and my office will keep working to ensure Arizona's children and teachers can learn and work in safe and secure school buildings.

Another step we will take to help all communities to have the strong, effective public schools they deserve is to ensure we are funding all schools fairly.

Currently, our state government distributes additional per-pupil funding based on school letter grades and assessment results. However, this approach has largely benefitted only schools in high-wealth areas of Arizona's two largest counties – Maricopa and Pima – while leaving rural and economically struggling areas behind.

To address this inequity, my budget redirects the 68.6 million dollars for that program to the Base Support Level, which goes to all schools across our state instead.

Let me go on the record to say that any school that accepts taxpayer dollars should have to abide by the same accountability standards that all district schools do. We have seen too many examples of individuals and shady corporations taking advantage of the system and our students.

Let's work together to require that any school that accepts public dollars also participates in the Auditor General's annual school district spending report as well as take other steps to ensure our taxpayer dollars are going where they should and being spent properly.

Beyond this work to ensure transparency for how taxpayer funds are spent, there are other direct actions to support our schools and students.

We need to prioritize hiring social workers and counselors for our schools to address the mental health crisis among children and teens. Currently each counselor in an Arizona school provides services for more than 700 kids on average. That's the highest ratio in the nation and nearly three times the recommended standard. That's unacceptable and we must do better.

I strongly urge the legislature to continue bringing solutions to my desk to ensure our public schools—in all communities—have the resources they need to help our kids succeed.

Let us now turn our attention to opportunities for our state's next generation after they graduate high school, where my administration will work to help create access to a wide range of education opportunities as they embark on the next chapter of their lives.

That means investing in community colleges—particularly in rural Arizona – as well as dual-enrollment programs statewide so no matter where a young adult lives, they have the opportunity to earn college credit or get a good-paying job.

For tens of thousands of other students, choosing to pursue a four-year degree from one of our state's major public universities is the right path—and make no mistake, we have three of the finest colleges in the country right here.

Arizona State University, Northern Arizona University, and the University of Arizona all produce workforce-ready graduates, attract millions of dollars in investments, and push the boundaries of knowledge and innovation.

They are incredible resources for our state's residents and for the entire nation and we must continue to improve access to these institutions for higher learning.

That's why we're expanding the Arizona Promise Scholarship Program, which last year made college more affordable for over 4,000 families, by including funding capacity for an additional 10,000 students who will now have an opportunity to pursue a college degree but otherwise would have been held back by the associated costs.

But we're not stopping there. In line with the will of Arizona's voters in passing Proposition 308 this past November, my budget allocates 40 million dollars to create the Promise for DREAMers Scholarship Program to cover all students, regardless of immigration status, who attend a state university.

My administration is ready and willing to work with any member of this legislature to find additional solutions. Let's work together to ensure Arizona's higher education opportunities are the best in the nation and put individuals on the path to future prosperity.

As we all know, we have so many reasons to be proud of Arizona. Companies are growing here and, as a result, the job market is robust. What's more, we have enormous potential on the horizon.

However, we must also acknowledge the flip side of this prosperity, that too many Arizona families are getting further away from achieving the American dream due to the high cost of housing.

Our state is no stranger to the boom-and-bust housing cycles—but this is something wholly different.

Three Arizona cities—Tucson, Mesa, and Phoenix – have seen some of the highest rent increases in the nation.

The number of individuals experiencing homelessness has risen significantly in recent years.

We can do better. Let's work together to ensure that here in Arizona, any person who wants to achieve the American Dream or have a safe roof over their head can do so.

My administration's first step will be to support a 150 million dollar investment into the Housing Trust Fund this year—and I will call for additional support in the years ahead.

In addition to these measures, last week I signed an executive order re-establishing the Interagency and Community Council on Homelessness and Housing. This council will help coordinate and foster collaboration among state and local agencies, the private sector, and nonprofits to help identify solutions for individuals and families experiencing homelessness or struggling with housing affordability.

Beyond housing, our efforts to support individuals and families must also address the rising costs of everyday items and services. Even as our state continues to be an incredible place to live and work, we can do more to help our fellow Arizonans get ahead.

That's why my budget sets aside 50 million dollars for a state-level, child tax credit for families earning less than 40,000 dollars a year to help pay for the rising costs of basic necessities for their children.

First Day

We will also help lower costs for Arizona families by exempting diapers and feminine hygiene products from our state's sales tax. These everyday items add up and we can and should help provide this relief to individuals and families who too often must choose between paying their bills or paying for the things they need to be healthy.

But this should only be the start. My administration is ready and willing to work with you—and my door will always be open to any member who brings forward a serious proposal to help Arizona families, seniors, and communities.

Let's work together to find ways to lower costs and help every community across our great state thrive economically.

Every community across our state also deserves to be safe. Building an Arizona for everyone means building a safe Arizona for everyone.

This obligation extends to our border, our broken immigration system, and the communities across the state who must continue to bear the brunt of Washington, D.C.'s decades of failure on this critical issue.

Unfortunately, immigration has been politicized for far too long. Arizona voters told us in November they don't want or need political stunts designed solely to garner sensationalist TV coverage and generate social media posts.

Speak to leaders in border communities and across our state and it's clear they need real solutions after decades of failed leadership by both parties. We must take a holistic, realistic, and humane approach to help solve this issue. That means supporting sheriffs and local law enforcement in impacted communities—and it also means supporting community centers and hospitals.

I am encouraged by the White House's recent actions to finally visit the border and to start proposing real steps to begin addressing the problems of the current system. And while optimistic, I will also continue to push Congress to do its job and pass comprehensive immigration reform.

Visit border communities and speak with local leaders and law enforcement like I—and many others here—have done and you come away with a broader understanding of the complexities of this issue and the urgent need to institute solutions.

That's why I have invited Homeland Security Secretary Alejandro Mayorkas to visit the border with me and meet with community leaders, sheriffs, non-profit representatives, and business executives in impacted communities who all want effective and humane solutions to this longtime challenge.

I look forward to working with local law enforcement, nonprofits, and community leaders throughout my time in this office to identify real solutions, hold the federal government accountable, and create a Safe Arizona for all its residents.

Now, ensuring a strong, safe future for Arizona means defending the freedoms of all of its residents. I refuse to stand by and do nothing as my daughter—or anyone's daughter—now has fewer rights today than I did growing up.

An overwhelming majority of Arizonans—more than 90 percent, in fact—believe abortion should be legal. It is time we all heed the message of the people of this state and meet this moment to ensure that we can always make our own healthcare decisions.

My administration will always protect reproductive freedom for all Arizonans. I will not support, and I will use every power of the governor's office to stop, any legislation or action that attacks, strips, or delays the liberty or inherent right of any individual to decide what's best for themselves or their families.

My budget will also match the federal Title Ten money our state receives to provide reproductive health services and family planning medication, bringing our total to more than 12 million dollars. This step will increase the program's impact here in Arizona and for significantly more low-income women.

However, this should only be a start. I urge members of the legislature to put bills on my desk that will protect women, support families, and create a future for Arizona where anyone regardless of gender can succeed.

Finally, none of the solutions—or even the future—I have spoken about today will be possible without our state's most precious resource—water.

We must talk about the challenge of our time: Arizona's decades-long drought, over usage of the Colorado River, and the combined ramifications on our water supply, our forests, and our communities.

We are in a critical moment where we must be unified, where we must form new and stronger partnerships, and where we must find bipartisan solutions at a local, statewide, and national level.

This issue does not stop at state or international borders. We will all thrive together in the future...or we will all be left with the catastrophic results of our failures.

From the work our current Senators Sinema and Kelly are leading, to the accomplishments of former Senator Jon Kyl and former Governor Bruce Babbitt, to decades of efforts by Arizonans before them, our state's leaders are at their best when they reach across the aisle for pragmatic solutions on this issue.

We should follow in their footsteps as we collectively face a drought unlike anything in modern times.

On January First, the Colorado River Tier Two mandatory water cuts went into effect—meaning Arizona will lose 21 percent of our water that comes from the most important river in the country. This equates to reducing our usage by 592,000 acre-feet just this year.

We must also all understand this: barring a miracle from nature, it will likely get worse before it gets better.

This should be a wake-up call for all of us, because it will take all of us to solve it. Legislators, public officials, the business community—each and every one of us must commit to the partnerships needed to avoid this.

The foundation of those partnerships must be rooted in honesty and transparency about the facts and what we are collectively facing.

For those reasons, in the next few minutes you will receive a previously unreleased report by the Arizona Department of Water Resources that shows that portions of Phoenix's far West Valley are currently short of the 100-year Assured Water Supply Program by 15 percent today. This report unequivocally shows that we have to act now, or this will only be the first new area that faces this kind of shortage.

I do not understand, and do not in any way agree with, my predecessor choosing to keep this report from the public and from members of this legislature. However, my decision to release this report signals how I plan to tackle our water issues openly and directly.

Experts here in Arizona and across the nation agree there is no "silver bullet" solution to our current water challenges. We must evaluate and invest in both short- and long-term efforts that will help us achieve our goals.

This reality drives the three components of my plan for a Resilient Arizona.

First, my administration has heard loud and clear that re-establishing the Governor's Energy Office is a priority for communities across the state. In response, we will relaunch this entity as the Governor's Office of Resiliency, which will focus on water, energy, and land use solutions. This office will help coordinate efforts with the many departments, tribal governments, universities, organizations, and others involved in this effort. Arizona needs partnerships on a local, state, regional, and national level, and I intend to put us in the best position to do so.

Next, my administration will issue an executive order to launch the Governor's Water Policy Council to modernize and expand the Arizona Groundwater Management Act. Facing our current reality, it's time to update groundwater management tools and protect groundwater supplies—particularly in rural communities.

We must take these actions today because in many parts of our state, there are effectively no restrictions on groundwater pumping and local communities have little-to-no support to manage water supplies. As a result, a new water user can move in, dig a well, and pump as much water as possible—even if it dries up the community's aquifer.

This is why you see a Saudi Arabian conglomerate pumping local groundwater nearly unchecked in La Paz County today, to grow water-intensive crops and send them to the other side of the planet.

We all know that's not right. Our groundwater should be used to support Arizonans, not foreign business interests.

Let's close this water poaching loophole and work together to modernize the Arizona Groundwater Management Act.

In addition to this action, my budget allocates funds to help rural communities set up Active Management Areas. All cities and towns in our state need to proactively manage our groundwater, and by funding this program we are providing a powerful tool to ensure we strike a balance between usage and recharging our water table.

For the last part of this approach, I look to you, members of the legislature. We are all in this together. Bring forward innovative solutions to this challenge of our time. We cannot let the same old partisan fights drag us down.

My administration is ready and willing to work with you and we will always do what's best for Arizona and its people.

It is my belief that we all understand the gravity of the challenges before us—and it is my hope that we will use this opportunity to once again prove to the people of our state, the nation, and around the world Arizona's visionary leadership when it comes to ensuring a stable water supply for the millions of people who call this place home.

These challenges will not be easy. Nor will the other issues we need to confront, including fixing prisons, improving accessibility for all Arizonans, lowering childcare costs, supporting veterans, protecting older and vulnerable Arizonans, and so much more.

But the people of Arizona did not send us to this capitol to solve easy problems or to leave them to the next generation. They sent us here to do the right thing - no matter how difficult that may prove to be. We will not let them down.

I spoke earlier in these remarks about Governor Mofford and how she challenged lawmakers to choose action to solve the challenges of their time. Perhaps nothing in her speech did more to drive home the urgency of the time than these words she shared in the conclusion of her speech:

"... we cannot delay. Opportunities fade. Arizona's future hangs in the balance.

"... I say to you, join with me in making these difficult decisions, and together we will journey towards the next frontier."

They did just that, and together, they put Arizona on a path to prosperity and improved the lives of millions of families. It is my sincere hope that we can do the same at this moment more than 30 years later.

In the days, months and years ahead—of all-night budget negotiations, marathon voting sessions, and seemingly impassable disagreements—let us never forget that we all hold a deep love for this state. We are here because we want to ensure the generations that follow us have a chance to discover that love, too.

Thank you for committing to public service, for your partnership in finding real solutions, and for the contributions we will all make going forward as we build an Arizona for everyone.

Now let's get to work.

BUSINESS ON THE SPEAKER'S DESK

Speaker Toma introduced Congressman Juan Carlos Romero Hicks, Member of the Mexican Chamber of Deputies.

Congressman Juan Carlos Romero Hicks addressed the House, his comments were as follows:

Buenas tardes. Qué gusto estar en este honorable recinto, otra vez, después de seis años. Gracias por su amable invitación.

Good afternoon. It is wonderful to be here in this honorable chamber, again, after almost 6 years. Thank you for your kind invitation.

We are living in a very complex era, characterized by the Covid-19 pandemic, the Russia-Ukraine war, world crime and insecurity, world migration and what some are calling an "economic global chaos." With this as background I come to you with a message: We must reinvent ourselves and the US-Mexico relationship to confront these new challenges! I come to you as the representative of my state, the state of Guanajuato, cradle of the Mexican independence movement, and as member of the Mexico. I also come to you as someone deeply interested in creating a better US-Mexico relationship because I have a bi-national heritage. My second last name is Hicks, from a family that came on the second ship after the Mayflower, called the Good Fortune, Nov. 11, 1621.

It is a particularly important moment for us to speak here. We have just finalized the Summit of North American Leaders in Mexico City, and I know that you as a nation are reflecting over what kind of relationship you want to have with Mexico. At the Summit we centered on themes such as inclusion, diversity, climate change, the environment, health, security, economic development and migration. The result from the meetings was a "roadmap" defining commitments which were negotiated among the three governments. It is hoped that we can create mechanisms to take advantage of an integration of the economies of Mexico, the USA and Canada, working together to face the great challenges of our times.

Arizona has been a great example of common sense and future focusing in the affairs of our relationship. The Arizona-Mexico Commission is a wonderful example of commitment, long term vision and shared results. I often remember the words of Governor Paul J. Fannin when he stated, "Dios nos hizo vecinos; seamos buenos vecinos!" ... "God made us neighbors, let us be good neighbors." He knew that being good neighbors is not easy, and that's why we should address questions like: Are we good neighbors? Can we do better? And, can we be more than neighbors? Can we be friends?

When seeking a closer friendship, we often look for what we have in common. The largest individual ancestry group in Arizona is Mexican (at 25.8%), followed by German, English and Irish (10.9%). Some analysts believe that Arizona will become a minority-majority state by the year 2027 based on current demographic trends. We are truly joined by family ties.

Last November, you had important midterm elections, and one of the great debates was over the impact the Latino vote. According to the PEW Research Center, in the last presidential elections 32 million Latinos were able to vote, becoming the largest ethnic minority.

It is important to notice that in 2024 both Mexico and the US will have presidential elections. (This had not occurred since the year 2000 with George W. Bush and Vicente Fox as winning candidates of their countries.) Many experts believe that 2024 will be the year in which Latinos will decide the elections in the US and in which Mexicans living in the US will vote in historic numbers.

Allow me to mention that in the year 2024, Mexico will possibly make use of a new electronic voting system. Though today there are only approximately 1.6 million Mexicans living in the US registered to vote, according to researchers there are almost 12 million first generation Mexicans in the US. Now, if we include the constitutional reform of 2021, in which children and grandchildren of Mexicans are considered Mexican citizens, the number of Mexicans abroad rises to 38 million. In addition, many Mexican Americans have the right to double nationality and can vote in both countries.

As I mentioned here in this chamber Feb. 23, 2017, in order to know each other better we need to spend time together, we need to share information, we need to research together, we need to learn together, we need to walk and dream together. Friendship, as described by Aristotle, is a relationship between two, where the two friends share goals and work together to achieve them.

I believe friendship should be our main goal. If we accept the challenge to move from neighbors to friends, we should probably start by the basics. St Augustine once said, "Nadie ama lo que no conoce" ... "You cannot love what you do not know." We need to know each other better and learn from each other.

We have built a relationship that goes further than the relationship between two federal governments. The US-Mexico connection means clients, suppliers, teammates. It means researching together. It means falling in love: there are 38 million Mexican-Americans in the States, and a significant percentage, close to 28 percent, of the married ones are married with non-Hispanic Americans. We are building families together, and that means we have children that are the sons and daughters of both countries. We must recognize that we share more than the biggest border of the world, that we share more than the biggest trade area in the world. We share the same future. We are bound by land, by history, by blood and by love, and we cannot let fear, ignorance, or greed come between us.

While our two presidents, Andres Manuel Lopez Obrador and Joseph Biden, at the Summit of North American Leaders, only touched the surface of possibilities of success for our relationship, millions of citizens from Mexico and the US are ready to change the history of North America. We know that we live in historic chaotic time, and we need historic solutions. We must become involved, seeking opportunities for shared success.

Before finishing my remarks, I would like to recognize a Mexican American leader amongst us.

Ambassador Don Tapia, you, like many in the U.S., make us proud. I would like to recognize your work as a veteran of this country, as the CEO of the largest Hispanicowned business in Arizona for 30 years, your philanthropist work in support of the neediest, and your recent tenure as U.S. Ambassador to Jamaica. Congratulations on recently becoming a Mexican citizen! Could you please join me?

On behalf of the State of Guanajuato I bring you a small token of our appreciation....

Finally, a word to Speaker Toma, President Petersen and Chairman Cook: I would like to invite the Congress of Arizona to Guanajuato and Mexico City. Almost six years ago I was honored to host you, and it's time to come again. Many of you in attendance have not visited Guanajuato nor San Miguel de Allende which are ranked best cities in the world to visit. Please honor us with your presence soon. Let's work together.

PROTEST

In accordance with Article IV, Part 2, Section 16, Constitution of Arizona, and House Rule 20, the following protest was entered:

Two weeks ago, some Republicans turned their backs on a duly elected governor and walked out. And then they promised to pass last year's budget rather than consider the Governor's proposal or to negotiate in good faith.

Now with virtually no notification we have sweeping proposed rules changes after only consulting with themselves. The lowlights include:

- A limit on Committee of the Whole debate to 30 minutes per bill.
- Efforts to reduce transparency where the Legislature grants itself the power to ignore state statutes on public records and document retention.

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- This gives the Speaker veto power over the majority on motions to amend or suspend the rules, and the power to unilaterally file lawsuits.
- Had the Speaker's vote been needed for a floor motion to count, Arizona would not have seen Medicaid expansion or the ballot referral of in-state tuition for DACA recipients.

Arizonans want a government that's open and transparent. This is not it.

Sadly, these rules changes are a continued pattern of disrespect, obstruction, and dysfunction. We want to work together to solve problems. Silencing of the minority just because you disagree with us sets an awful tone going forward and tells the public only some voices count."

At a time when one party holds just a narrow majority, we should respect the voters who are demanding that we work together, not diminish the voice from one side of the aisle. RULES OF THE HOUSE

Member Biasiucci moved that the House Rules, adopted on January 9, 2023, be amended by adopting the proposed Rules changes as printed and distributed together with any technical and conforming changes as determined by the Chief Clerk as long as the meaning is not changed, and that the House Rules as amended be adopted.

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RULES OF THE ARIZONA HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES 55^{th} 56th LEGISLATURE 2021-2022-2023-2024

RULE 1

MEMBERS

A. The House may punish its members for disorderly behavior and may, with the concurrence of two-thirds of the members elected to the House, expel any member (Arizona Constitution, Article IV, Part 2, Section 11). A violation of any of the House Rules shall be deemed disorderly behavior. When a roll call vote is ordered on the floor of the House and subject to the provisions of Rules 6 and 14, members are required to vote after a reasonable time, as determined by the Chair, and may be punished for disorderly conduct if the member fails to vote after a reasonable time.

B. When any member shall be guilty of a breach of any of the Rules and Orders of the House, and the House has determined that he has so transgressed; he shall not be permitted to vote or speak, except by way of excuse for the same, until he has made satisfaction.

C. ONLY MEMBERS MAY PRESENT A COMPLAINT TO THE ETHICS COMMITTEE CHAIRMAN REGARDING THE BEHAVIOR OF ANY MEMBER.

C. D. Any member having obtained leave of absence and having in his possession papers relative to business before the House shall leave same with the Chief Clerk.

RULE 2

ANNUAL SESSIONS

A. Except as provided herein, regular sessions shall be adjourned sine die no later than Saturday of the week in which the one hundredth day from the beginning of each regular session falls. The Speaker may by declaration authorize the extension of the session for a period not to exceed seven additional days. Thereafter the session can be extended only by a majority vote of the House.

B. If not considered in the regular session, the general appropriations bill, the general capital outlay bill and the university capital outlay bill may be considered each year in a special session which shall be called only for that purpose.

RULE 3

OFFICERS AND EMPLOYEES

A. The House shall elect as an officer of the House a Speaker, and shall elect a Chief Clerk and such other employees as the House directs.

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B. All House employees shall be under the immediate direction of the Speaker of the House, who shall have the power to designate the person who shall be in immediate supervision of the different departments.

C. Employment, compensation and termination of personnel shall be determined by the Speaker.

D. Employees of the House are prohibited from lobbying during the term of their employment, and a violation of this Rule will be sufficient cause for the summary discharge of the offending employee.

E. No person shall be employed as a House employee who is an agent for the prosecution of any claim against the state or who is interested in such claim otherwise than as an original claimant and it shall be the duty of the Speaker to report to the House any violation of this Rule.

RULE 4

THE SPEAKER

A. The Speaker shall take the Chair at the hour to which the House shall have adjourned; immediately call the members to order; cause the roll to be called; and, if a quorum be present, cause the Journal of the proceedings of the last day's sitting to be read, if requested by a majority of the members elected to the House.

B. The Speaker shall preserve order and decorum; decide all points of order subject to an appeal to the House, on which appeal no member shall speak more than once, except by permission of the House; may speak to points of order in preference to other members; and may vote in all cases.

C. The Speaker shall sign all bills, resolutions, memorials, addresses, writs, warrants and subpoenas issued by order of the House.

D. At each session the Speaker shall announce the Order of Business in conformity with Rule 7.

E. The Speaker may appoint a member as Speaker Pro Tempore to perform the duties of the Speaker. In his omission to make such appointment, the House shall proceed to elect a Speaker Pro Tempore to act during the Speaker's absence.

F. The Speaker shall have the general control of the House Chamber and the corridors, passages and committee, hearing and staff rooms of the House of Representatives and all other matters which pertain to the House of Representatives' building and related parking lots. The Speaker shall promulgate a written code of conduct and a written harassment prevention policy applicable to staff.

G. All debts incurred by the House of Representatives, either during session or between sessions of the Legislature, shall be paid by claims drawn on the Finance Division; and all claims so issued shall be signed by the Speaker.

H. The Speaker is authorized to call meetings of standing and select committees of the House during periods when the House is not in session and to approve claims for travel and subsistence incurred by members of such committees in attendance thereon, as provided by law.

I. The Speaker shall be responsible for authorizing the accounts for the pay, mileage and subsistence of members and employees, and pay them as provided by law.

J. Every bill, resolution and memorial, except death resolutions and Senate bills to be substituted on third reading pursuant to Rule 7 C, shall automatically be assigned to the Rules Committee at the time of assignment to another standing committee without action upon the part of the Speaker.

K. THE SPEAKER IS AUTHORIZED TO BRING OR ASSERT IN ANY FORUM ON BEHALF OF THE HOUSE ANY CLAIM OR RIGHT ARISING OUT OF ANY INJURY TO THE HOUSE'S POWERS OR DUTIES UNDER THE CONSTITUTION OR LAWS OF THIS STATE.

RULE 5

THE CHIEF CLERK

A. The Chief Clerk shall keep the Journal of the House and enter therein the record of each day's proceedings, including every question of order which shall be decided on appeal, with the decision thereon, and the hour of adjournment.

B. The Chief Clerk shall prepare copies of the Committee of the Whole Calendar and deliver the same in paper form or electronically to the members, and prepare such other memoranda as the House or Speaker may direct.

C. The Chief Clerk shall transmit to the Senate every bill or other measure, immediately after its passage, to which concurrence is necessary.

D. The Chief Clerk shall transmit all messages from the House to the Senate and Governor, unless the House shall otherwise direct, and shall perform such additional duties as may be assigned by the House or Speaker.

E. The Assistant DEPUTY Chief Clerk shall, in the absence of the Chief Clerk, perform the duties of the Chief Clerk.

RULE 6

ROLL CALL, QUORUM, CALL OF THE HOUSE

A. Every member shall be present within the Hall of the House during its sitting, unless excused by the Speaker prior to roll call or necessarily prevented; and shall vote on each question put, unless the member has a personal financial interest in the question, as set forth in Rule 35 34 or unless the member is excused from voting in accordance with Rule 14.

B. Upon every roll call the names of the members shall be called alphabetically by surnames. When members have the same or similar surnames, the designation of the district OR FIRST NAME INITIAL shall be added.

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C. The majority of the members elected to the House shall constitute a quorum to do business; but a smaller number may meet, adjourn from day to day and compel the attendance of absent members in such manner and under such penalties as the House may prescribe. The House shall not adjourn for more than three days between the day of adjournment and the day of reconvening, nor to any place other than that in which it may be sitting, without the consent of the Senate (Arizona Constitution, Article IV, Part 2, Section 9).

D. The purpose of the Call of the House is to compel the attendance of absent members.

E. A motion or demand for a Call of the House is not debatable or amendable and may not be laid on the table, postponed, referred to committee or have other subsidiary motions applied to it, OTHER THAN TO RECESS OR ADJOURN.

F. When no quorum is present, a Call of the House takes precedence over all other motions. Any member may raise the question of no quorum; and if a quorum is not present, the House must either order a Call of the House, recess or adjourn. The motion for a Call of the House is agreed to by a majority of those voting, but may not be ordered by less FEWER than 10 members including the Speaker.

G. When a quorum is present, a Call of the House ranks as a "question of privilege". A Call of the House AND may be ordered by a majority of the members voting, provided the minimum number authorized to order a Call of the House is present.

H. When a Call of the House has been ordered, the doors are closed, the Chief Clerk calls the roll of members and notes the absentees. The Sergeant at Arms shall forthwith proceed to bring in absent members until two-thirds of the members elected to the House are present, and present them at the bar of the House, whereupon the members shall be noted as present, discharged from custody, be given an opportunity to vote; and their vote shall be recorded.

RULE 7

ORDER OF BUSINESS,

SUBSTITUTION OF SENATE BILLS MEASURES FOR HOUSE BILLS MEASURES

A. The House shall convene at the call of the Speaker each day during legislative session unless a different time or day is fixed by the Body. UNLESS THE BODY DIRECTS OTHERWISE, the daily Order of Business shall be as follows:

- 1. Roll Call
- 2. Prayer
- 3. Pledge of Allegiance
- 4. Approval of the Journal
- 5. Petitions, Memorials and Remonstrances
- 6. Reports of Standing Committees

7. Reports of Select Committees

8. Business on the Speaker's Desk

9. Bills and Other Business from the Senate

10. Motions to Discharge Committees

11. First Reading of Bills

12. Second Reading of Bills

13. Third Reading of Bills

14. Unfinished Business

15. Committee of the Whole

16. Disposition of Business from Committee of the Whole

17. Orders of the Day

B. At any time after the reading and approval of the Journal any member may authorize a motion to be made that the House go into Committee of the Whole for the consideration of bills, raising revenue or the general appropriations bill.

C. When Senate measures are received which are identical to House measures which have already been favorably reported by the Committee of the Whole, they may be substituted for such House measures on Third Reading.

D. Business shall be taken up and shall be considered only when the class to which it belongs shall be declared to be in order. Questions of privilege including introduction of guests shall be in order as provided in Rule $\frac{26}{25}$ (B).

E. All questions relating to the priority of business shall be decided by a majority of those voting without debate.

F. When multiple legislative sessions are held on one legislative day, the Prayer and the Pledge of Allegiance under the Order of Business in subsection A of this rule are required to be followed only for the first session of that day.

RULE 8

BILLS, RESOLUTIONS, MEMORIALS, ENGROSSED COPIES,

AMENDMENTS

A. Every bill, resolution and memorial (HEREAFTER "MEASURE") shall be read by sections on three different days, unless in case of emergency, two-thirds of the House deem it expedient to dispense with this Rule. The vote on Third Reading and Final Passage of any bill, resolution or memorial MEASURE shall be taken by ayes and nays on roll call. Final Passage shall be the final disposition of a bill by the House (refer to Arizona Constitution, Article IV, Part 2, Section 12).

B. Bills, resolutions and memorials MEASURES may be introduced by a member by presenting copies of such bill, resolution or memorial MEASURE to the office of the Chief Clerk. The Chief Clerk shall have 24 hours to process such bill, resolution or memorial MEASURE preceding the day of actual introduction. The name of the sponsor or sponsors shall be on the attached signature page of the bill-MEASURE. Introductions "by request" shall be so designated. A bill MEASURE introduced in the House may be cosponsored by Senate members. A measure shall only have one prime sponsor; all others shall be designated as cosponsors. A House member's cosponsorship may be withdrawn by that member from any House measure that is in possession of the house. Cosponsorship withdrawal is irrevocable. Following an effective withdrawal of cosponsorship of the measure, the member shall not be identified as a sponsor of the House. Withdrawal of cosponsorship shall be effective if all of the following apply:

1. The member gives a written statement of withdrawal in the form prescribed by the Chief Clerk, delivering the statement to the office of the Chief Clerk and a copy to the Engrossing Clerk.

2. The measure has not been brought for a vote on Third Reading of Bills.

C. Bills, resolutions and memorials MEASURES may be introduced during the first 29 days of a regular session and during the first 10 days of a special session. Thereafter, with the exception of death resolutions, introduction may be allowed only with the permission of the Rules Committee. Every bill, resolution or memorial MEASURE shall have one prime sponsor. A member may not be the prime sponsor of more than seven bills introduced after 5:00 p.m. on the fourth day of each regular session. For purposes of this Rule the first name on a bill shall be considered the prime sponsor.

D. Bills, resolutions and memorials MEASURES may be prefiled by any member-elect for introduction in the first regular session during the period following the filing of the certification of election until the first day of the regular session. Bills, resolutions and memorials MEASURES may be prefiled for introduction in the second regular session during the period from November 15 next preceding the second regular session until the first day of the second regular session. Bills, resolutions and memorials MEASURES may be prefiled for introduction in any special session during the period following the Governor's proclamation until the first day of the special session, such bills MEASURES being germane to the call.

E. A bill, resolution or memorial MEASURE shall be prefiled in the same manner prescribed for introduction. Bills, resolutions and memorials MEASURES prefiled for introduction pursuant to this Rule shall be deemed to have been actually introduced on the first day of each regular or special session.

F. INTRODUCTORY SETS ARE THE SOLE RESPONSIBILITY OF MEMBERS OF THE LEGISLATURE. MEMBERS ARE RESPONSIBLE FOR CARRYING, SEEKING SIGNATURES AND SUBMITTING INTRODUCTORY SETS IN THE CHIEF CLERK'S OFFICE.

F. G. Bills, resolutions and memorials MEASURES accepted for introduction shall be entered in the Journal by the Chief Clerk.

G. H. The original of a bill, resolution or memorial MEASURE shall be designated by blue backing, marked "original" and shall remain in the possession of the Chief Clerk. Copies shall be distributed as the Speaker directs.

H. I. All bills MEASURES prepared for introduction which propose to add to the statutes or amend existing statutes shall show the proposed new language in capital letters (upper case) and the deletions shall be shown in regular type (lower case) lined through.

I. J. On First Reading of Bills, resolutions or memorials, the measure shall be referred to the Chief Clerk for printing. The Speaker shall determine the number of bills, resolutions or memorials MEASURES to be duplicated.

J. K. On First Reading OF BILLS, all bills, resolutions or memorials MEASURES shall be referred by the Speaker or the Speaker's designee to appropriate committees. All amendments proposed by the committee shall be separately reported TO THE CHIEF CLERK'S OFFICE. Each committee shall report each measure it carefully considers back to the House with such recommendations as may be deemed proper. If the Speaker designates his referral authority pursuant to this rule to any member of the House other than the Speaker Pro Tempore the designation shall be in writing, state the period of time for which it is effective, and be filed in advance with the Chief Clerk.

K. L. IF A MEASURE HAS MULTIPLE COMMITTEE ASSIGNMENTS, THE FIRST COMMITTEE MUST HEAR THE MEASURE BEFORE THE SECOND COMMITTEE. IF THE FIRST COMMITTEE FAILS THE MEASURE, THE MEASURE CANNOT BE HEARD BY THE SECOND COMMITTEE. When the first committee reports the measure to the House, the Speaker places it on the House Calendar (Inactive Calendar). When the last committee to which the measure was referred reports to the House, it is the property of the Committee on Rules, which considers the measure. The Speaker sets the order of the measures on the Active Calendar for the consideration of the Committee of the Whole.

L. M. The Speaker may direct that any bill MEASURE be second read at the time of its consideration by the Committee of the Whole or on any day prior thereto.

M. N. When the Committee of the Whole has completed its deliberations, it is dissolved and reports to the House. By motion, the report of the Committee of the Whole is adopted by the House (or amended) and the Speaker properly assigns the House measures (or amended Senate measures) to be engrossed for Third Reading.

N. O. The original and two copies of each engrossed measure shall be on paper of durable quality and shall be stamped on each page thereof with the blind embossed stamp of the House. All engrossed pages not having a full complement of typed lines shall be marked from the end of the typed page to within one inch of the end of such page. The original House engrossed House bill-MEASURE shall have a green backing. The original House engrossed Senate bill MEASURE shall have an orange backing.

 Θ . P. The engrossed measure shall not be subject to amendment on Third Reading or Final Passage of the measure.

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P. Q. The House shall provide the Senate and the Legislative Council with sufficient copies of each amended engrossed House measure on green paper with a cover page. For House amendments to Senate measures, the same number of copies shall be provided but shall consist only of those pages containing the adopted House amendments and cover page. For unamended House measures the same number of green cover pages shall be provided stating that the measure passed as introduced, which will be identical to the original and printed copies.

Q. R. All bills, resolutions, memorials MEASURES and engrossed measures shall be line-numbered, and such numbering shall begin with the enacting clause. Uniform sized paper, $8-1/2" \times 11"$, shall be used. All paper and ink used by the House for the purpose of permanent records shall be of durable quality.

R. S. Amendments shall have uniform headings and shall read "amendment to" and shall be in the same form as the original bill-MEASURE. The amendment shall refer to page and line number only and when referring to more than one line shall read "lines ... through ...". If everything after the enacting clause is stricken, the amendment shall read "strike everything after the enacting clause". All amendments shall contain the language which states "amend title to conform". Substantive floor amendments shall be printed and placed on each member's desk a reasonable time prior to Committee of the Whole unless previously distributed. Substantive proposed amendments shall be reviewed for constitutionality and approved as to proper form by House Rules Counsel or other qualified personnel designated by the Speaker prior to presentation in all committees, including Committee of the Whole and conference committees.

S- T. No amendment to strike everything after the enacting clause and insert new material shall be in order unless notice of intent to offer such an amendment has been given by at least 5:00 p.m. on the second previous working day, excluding Saturday, Sundays and holidays, in advance of the committee meeting at which the amendment is to be considered by delivering ELECTRONICALLY DISTRIBUTING a draft of the proposed amendment to the office or the secretary of each member of the committee; AND RELEVANT SUPPORT STAFF AND posting such notice at the Information Desk and leaving a copy of the draft in the office of the Chief Clerk ONLINE. WHEN NOTICE OF INTENT TO OFFER A STRIKE-EVERYTHING AMENDMENT HAS BEEN PROPERLY EXECUTED, A REVISED COMMITTEE AGENDA SHALL BE POSTED AND DISTRIBUTED THAT LISTS THE TITLE OF THE PROPOSED STRIKE-EVERYTHING AMENDMENT AT THE INFORMATION DESK AND ONLINE. Following the adoption of a strike-everything amendment to a House measure in possession of the House, a House member's cosponsorship may be withdrawn upon submission of a written request from the cosponsor to the Chief Clerk prior to third reading.

RULE 9

COMMITTEES

A. All committees, except such as the House shall select, shall be appointed by the Speaker.

B. Standing Committees of the House shall consist of the following:

Appropriations

Commerce

Education

Government

Health & Human Services

Judiciary

Land, Agriculture & Rural Affairs

Municipal Oversight & Elections

Military Affairs & Public Safety

Natural Resources, Energy & Water

Regulatory Affairs

Rules

Transportation & Infrastructure

Ways and Means

C. Each Standing Committee shall adopt and file with the Chief Clerk's Office rules of procedure consistent with the Rules of the House and shall include the following:

1. With the exception of executive sessions ordered by a majority of the committee constituting a quorum, all committee meetings shall be open to the other members of the Legislature, the press and public so long as proper decorum is maintained.

2. All committees shall meet at regularly scheduled times and places unless cancelled with the permission of the Speaker. In the absence of the chairman, the vice chairman shall preside. In the absence of both the chairman and vice chairman, some other committee member designated by the Speaker shall preside.

3. The committee chairman (presiding officer) other than the chairman of the Committee on Rules shall prepare an agenda and distribute copies to committee members, the Information Desk and the Chief Clerk's Office by 5:00 p.m. at least five days before the committee meeting. Absence of a bill, memorial or resolution from the committee agenda will prohibit its consideration unless unanimous consent of all committee members is obtained. Unless a reconsideration motion has been offered and failed, a chairman may place a measure that failed in committee on any subsequent agenda.

4. A measure not on the committee agenda shall be scheduled for discussion at the next subsequent committee meeting by presentation of a petition containing the signatures of two-thirds or more of the committee members.

5. A roll call vote shall be taken in each standing committee when final action on any measure is voted.

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6. Written committee reports shall be filed with the Chief Clerk's Office within a reasonable time but no later than two weeks from time of completion of meetings. A recording of the meeting shall be made available for public inspection three working days after the meeting. Attendance records of all committee meetings shall be filed with the Chief Clerk's Office within 24 hours from time of completion of meetings.

7. Special meetings may be called by the chairman but require permission of the Speaker and notice to members and the general public at the Information Desk by 5:00 p.m. on the previous day, except that the notice of a special meeting of the Committee on Rules may be given in open session prior to the meeting and does not require the Speaker's permission.

D. The Speaker is authorized to call meetings of standing and select committees of the House during periods when the House is not in session and to approve claims for travel and subsistence incurred by members of such committees in attendance thereon, as provided by law. Notwithstanding the statutory authority, the Speaker, after consultation with the committee chairman, may appoint members to the committee of reference.

E. No committee other than the Committee on Rules shall meet while the House is meeting in session without special permission of the Speaker.

F. Except as provided herein, all House measures shall be considered by committees prior to the Saturday of the week in which the sixtieth day from the beginning of each regular session falls and all Senate bills shall be considered by committees prior to the Saturday of the week in which the ninetieth day from the beginning of each regular session falls. No committee except the Rules Committee shall consider a measure in violation of this subsection without the written permission of the Speaker.

G. Notwithstanding Rule 8(T), no proposed amendment in the Committee on Rules to strike everything after the enacting clause and insert new material shall be in order.

H. All interim committee meetings shall be open to the other members of the Legislature, the press and public so long as proper decorum is maintained, with the exception of executive sessions ordered by a majority of the committee constituting a quorum.

RULE 10

REPORTS OF COMMITTEES

A. Reports of Standing Committees shall be announced to the House upon receipt of reports from the committees. Reports from the following committees concerning matters herein named shall have precedence and may be received at any time except in Committee of the Whole:

1. The Committee on Rules on joint rules, order of business and rules relating to the order of consideration of bills;

2. The Committee on Judiciary on the right of a member to his seat;

3. The Committee on Ways and Means on bills for raising revenue;

4. The Committee on Appropriations on all matters referred to it.

B. When a report of a committee is printed, it shall include a minority report, if requested.

RULE 11

CALENDARS

A. There shall be the following calendars to which all business reported from committees shall be referred:

1. A House Calendar on which shall be entered all bills and other measures in the order reported from the committees, and such business as the House may directly place upon the calendar for consideration.

2. The Active Calendar of the Committee of the Whole House on which shall be entered all bills and other measures referred to the Committee of the Whole.

B. The Third Reading Consent Calendar shall be set by the Speaker and shall consist of select unamended measures reported out of all committees to which they were referred. It shall be dated, printed, placed on each member's desk or delivered electronically and posted at the Information Desk two working days prior to being accepted. Any member who wishes to protest any measure bypassing the Committee of the Whole may submit a protest in writing to the Chief Clerk's Office with a copy for the Speaker's Office during the two-day posting. This protest will automatically remove the measure from the Third Reading Consent Calendar. Subject to Rule 12(O), the measures remaining on the Third Reading Consent Calendar will then be placed on the Third Reading Calendar.

C. The COW Consent Calendar shall be set by the Speaker and shall consist of select amended measures reported out of all committees to which they were referred. It shall be dated, printed, placed on each member's desk or delivered electronically and posted at the information desk two working days prior to being accepted. Any member who wishes to protest any measure being subject to group motion and adoption of all committee amendments and instead who wishes to require that the amended measure be subject to debate in the Committee of the Whole may submit a protest in writing to the Chief Clerk's Office with a copy for the Speaker's Office during the two-day posting. This protest will automatically remove the measure from the COW Consent Calendar. Additionally, the filing of a floor amendment with the Chief Clerk will automatically remove the measure from the COW Consent Calendar. Subject to rule 12(O), the measures remaining on the COW Consent Calendar and passed will then be placed on the Third Reading Calendar.

RULE 12

COMMITTEE OF THE WHOLE; ADDITIONAL COMMITTEE OF THE WHOLE

A. When the House shall determine to go into Committee of the Whole, the Speaker shall leave the Chair after appointing a chairman to preside.

B. In Committee of the Whole, business shall be transacted in accordance with its priority on the Calendar, unless such priority be determined by the House before going into Committee of the Whole.

C. A majority of the members of the House shall constitute a quorum to do business in Committee of the Whole.

D. When a Committee of the Whole finds itself without a quorum, the Chairman shall direct the Sergeant at Arms to bring members to the chamber or cause the roll to be called, and thereupon the Committee shall rise and the Chairman shall report the names of the absentees to the House, and such names shall be entered in the Journal. If on such roll call a quorum shall appear, the Committee shall thereupon resume its sitting without further order of the House.

E. In Committee of the Whole the Rules of the House shall govern whenever applicable.

F. In Committee of the Whole all questions shall be decided by a majority of those voting.

G. No seconds are required to motions in Committee of the Whole.

H. In Committee of the Whole the bill MEASURE shall first be read through by the Chief Clerk, unless the Committee shall otherwise order. This shall constitute second reading of the bill unless it has been previously second read. After the proper motion the bill MEASURE is open to debate and amendment.

I. AFTER A MEASURE IS MOVED IN COMMITTEE OF THE WHOLE, THE MEASURE MAY BE DEBATED FOR A MAXIMUM OF 30 MINUTES. AFTER 30 MINUTES, THE AMENDMENTS ARE MOVED AND EXPLAINED BY THE SPONSOR OR THE CHAIR'S DESIGNEE AND VOTED WITHOUT DEBATE OR QUESTIONS. DEBATE ON ANY MEASURE CAN BE EXTENDED BY A VOTE OF A MAJORITY OF THE MEMBERS PRESENT. MOTIONS TO AMEND THE COW REPORT ARE PERMITTED, BUT EXPLANATIONS OF VOTES ARE NOT.

I J. When a bill MEASURE is under debate in Committee of the Whole, the following recommendations are in order:

1. Do pass

2. Be recommitted to a committee for further study

3. Do pass as amended

4. Do not pass

5. Be retained on the Calendar

6. Retain its place on the Calendar

7. Call for the previous question

J K. The following motions are not in order in Committee of the Whole:

1. To adjourn

2. Appoint, authorize or discharge committees

3. Lay on the table

4. Reconsideration

K L. A roll call vote shall be taken in Committee of the Whole when a motion to recommend "DO PASS" or "DO PASS AS AMENDED" is defeated. No other roll call votes shall be taken in Committee of the Whole.

L M. When the Committee of the Whole has completed its deliberations, it is dissolved and reports to the House. By motion the report of the Committee of the Whole is adopted by the House (or amended) and the Speaker properly assigns the House measures (or amended Senate measures) to be engrossed for Third Reading.

 \mathbf{M} N. With the exception of committee amendments, no proposed amendment in Committee of the Whole to strike everything after the enacting clause and insert new material shall be in order and the report of the Committee of the Whole shall not be amended to circumvent this Rule.

N O. Without objection, a motion to recommend that a measure do pass or do pass amended may be made in Committee of the Whole grouping together unamended measures and

amended measures on the COW Consent Calendar. Upon request by any member, a measure shall be excluded from the mass motion.

 Θ P. The House may by a majority vote of those voting bring a measure otherwise designated as available for Third Reading to Committee of the Whole for amendment or further amendment, except no proposed amendment to strike everything after the enacting clause and insert new material is in order.

RULE 13

SITTING AS IN COMMITTEE OF THE WHOLE

The House may by a majority of those voting sit as in Committee of the Whole for consideration of technical changes to measures and any subject, except no proposed amendment to strike everything after the enacting clause and insert new material is in order.

RULE 14

VOTING

A. All motions may be determined by a voice vote, teller, or on request of two members by a roll call, and by declaration of the result by the Speaker or designated member; provided that the voice vote shall not apply to Third Reading and Final Passage of a bill, resolution or memorial ANY MEASURE.

B. No member shall be permitted to vote unless present in person to cast his vote.

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C. No member shall vote for another, nor shall any person not a member cast a vote for a member. In addition to such penalties as may be prescribed by law, any member who shall vote or attempt to vote for another member may be punished in such manner as the House may determine. If a person not a member shall vote or attempt to vote for any member he shall be barred from the floor of the House for the remainder of the session and may be further punished in such manner as the House may deem proper, in addition to such punishment as may be prescribed by law.

D. When a roll call vote is ordered, every member who shall be within the Hall of the House shall vote, aye or nay, unless the member has filed a statement of personal financial interest in the question or is excused by the House pursuant to subsection E.

E. Subject to Rule 4(B), when a roll call vote is ordered, no member shall leave the chamber or the Speaker's conference room until the vote is declared. THE CHAMBER INCLUDES THE FLOOR AND THE SPEAKER'S OFFICE SUITE. The roll will be taken once only. When a member declines to vote, the member shall be required to specify the reason. If a member declares a personal financial interest in the question and the member has failed to file a statement pursuant to rule 34 or if the reason given is other than a personal financial interest in the question, the presiding officer shall submit the question to the House, "Shall the member be excused from voting for the reason given?" The question shall be decided without debate before the roll call vote is taken and the result is announced.

F. A member may change his vote after the roll call has been completed and before announcement of the result, but not thereafter.

G. Every member shall have the privilege of explaining his vote ON SUBSTANTIVE MAIN MOTIONS with relevant comments (such explanation shall not exceed three minutes) and shall further be permitted to have his written explanation placed on file in the Office of the Chief Clerk and the Journal shall so show except that this THE provision ON WRITTEN EXPLANATIONS shall not apply in committees of the House. THE PRIVILEGE DOES NOT EXTEND TO INCIDENTAL MAIN MOTIONS OR PROCEDURAL MOTIONS; HOWEVER, A MEMBER FROM EACH SIDE MAY EXPLAIN THE RATIONALE FOR THE VOTE FOR UP TO THREE MINUTES, THE AFFIRMATIVE CLOSING.

H. The Speaker or designated member shall declare all votes; but if any member doubts a voice vote prior to the declaration of the vote by the Speaker or designated member, a rising vote shall be ordered and the result declared.

RULE 15

ELECTRIC ROLL CALL SYSTEM

A. In all cases where a rule of the House of Representatives refers to "roll call", such reference shall be understood to refer also to the "taking" of the vote by an electric roll call system.

B. When taking the ayes and nays on any question to be voted upon, the electric roll call system, so-called, may be used, and when so used shall have the same force and effect as a roll call taken as otherwise provided in these rules.

C. When the House is ready to vote upon any question requiring a roll call, and the vote is to be taken by the electric roll call system, the Chair shall announce: "You have heard the motion" or "You have heard the ______ reading of (designating the matter to be voted upon). Those in favor will vote aye. Those opposed will vote nay. Do not vote until you hear the bell. The House will now proceed to vote."

D. When sufficient time has been allowed the members to vote, the Chair shall announce: "Have you all voted?" and after a short pause shall say: "The Clerk will now record the vote."

E. The Chief Clerk shall immediately start the recording equipment and, when completely recorded, shall present the result to the Chair, who shall announce same to the House. The Chief Clerk shall enter upon the Journal the result in the manner provided by the Rules of the House.

RULE 16

MOTION TO AMEND, GERMANENESS

A. When a motion or proposition is under consideration, a motion to amend and a motion to amend that amendment shall be in order. No amendment in the third degree shall be allowed.

B. It shall be in order to offer a further amendment by the way of a substitute amendment.

C. A motion to strike out and insert is indivisible, but a motion to strike out being lost shall neither preclude amendment nor shall a motion or proposition on a subject different from that under consideration be admitted under the color of amendment.

D. The Arizona Constitution (Article IV, Part 2, Section 13) provides in part that "every act shall embrace but one subject and matters properly connected therewith, ...". To comply with this requirement, an amendment may not expand the scope of the original **bill** MEASURE to give it a new purpose. A **bill** MEASURE including any amendments shall be presumed to contain one subject if:

1. The resulting bill MEASURE has one general purpose and all other matters contained therein are related to that purpose or necessary to effectuate the purpose.

2. The resulting bill MEASURE is a major revision of a program or agency and each of the provisions relates to the revision.

3. The bill MEASURE offers only technical or conforming changes to the statutes.

4. The bill MEASURE is an omnibus taxation or appropriation measure and each provision relates to the same general purpose of the bill.

5. The bill MEASURE is a result of a strike everything after the enacting clause amendment and substitutes material designed to accomplish only one purpose.

E. In filling blanks, the largest sum and the longest time shall be put first.

F. Upon request of any member, and an affirmative majority vote, each amendment shall be considered separately.

RULE 17

SENATE AMENDMENTS, CONFERENCE COMMITTEES,

CONFERENCE REPORTS, FINAL PASSAGE

A. Any amendment by the Senate to any House bill MEASURE shall be subject to one of the following:

1. Except as provided in paragraph 4 of this subsection, concur in Senate amendments by voice vote and Final Passage by roll call vote.

2. Refuse to concur in Senate amendments and appointment of Conference Committee (simple or free).

3. Speaker may refer the bill MEASURE with the Senate amendments to a committee which after study shall recommend concurrence or nonconcurrence.

4. A CONFERENCE COMMITTEE IS NOT REQUIRED WHEN A MEASURE RETURNS FROM THE SENATE AND A SECTION OF LAW HAS BEEN ELIMINATED DUE TO AN INADEQUATE VOTE THRESHOLD ON A PROP 105 OR PROP 108 REQUIREMENT ON THIRD READING. HOWEVER, THE MEASURE SHALL BE VOTED ON FINAL PASSAGE PRIOR TO TRANSMISSION TO THE GOVERNOR.

4.-5. The Speaker may refer a measure that was subject to Senate amendments that introduced new material or was the subject of a strike everything amendment to a free Conference Committee that is primarily comprised of members of a standing committee that is customarily assigned similar subject matter and the measure's prime sponsor. Public testimony shall be allowed at the conference committee.

B. Any amendment by the Senate which includes the addition of the emergency clause or the requirements for enactment clause (refer to Arizona Constitution, Article IX, section 22) or a three-fourths clause to amend or supersede an initiative or a referendum or to appropriate or divert funds created by an initiative or a referendum (refer to Arizona Constitution, Article IV, Part 1, Section 1, Subsections (6) (C), (6) (D) or (14)) shall require a two-thirds vote of the members elected to the House for Final Passage with the emergency clause or the requirements for enactment clause or a three-fourths vote of the members elected to the House for Final Passage of a measure to amend or supersede an initiative or a referendum or to appropriate or divert funds created by an initiative or a referendum.

C. Conference Committees may be either simple or free. A Simple Conference Committee shall be limited to points of disagreement between the two Houses and shall not add unrelated new material, except to conform the provisions to other sections of the **bill** MEASURE, enactments of the current session or procedural requirements. A Free Conference Committee may recommend striking amendments, compromising disagreements or inserting something entirely new except that a Free Conference Committee may not recommend striking everything after the enacting clause and inserting new material. A Free Conference Committee shall not take final action on a Free Conference Committee report to a House measure unless the measure has been heard in a public hearing of the Free Conference Committee.

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D. A copy of each Conference Committee report shall be placed on each member's desk or delivered electronically a reasonable time before consideration of the report. Any member may request, and the Speaker shall grant, a one-time delay per measure of up to 24 hours prior to adoption of the Conference Committee report. Adopted conference reports and the House bills MEASURES to which they pertain shall be referred for engrossing, and the bill after being engrossed shall be placed on Final Passage.

E. Except as provided herein, Conference Committees shall consider all bills MEASURES prior to the Saturday of the week in which the ninety-seventh day from the beginning of each regular session falls. No Conference Committee shall meet to consider a bill MEASURE after such time without the written permission of the Speaker.

RULE 18

DECORUM AND DEBATE

A. When a member desires to speak in debate or deliver any matter to the House, or make a motion, he shall rise and address himself to the Chair, and on being recognized may address the House. He shall confine himself to the question and avoid personalities. No member shall impeach or impugn motives of any other member's argument or vote.

B. When a measure is presented for consideration to the House or in Committee of the Whole, the sponsor of such measure shall be entitled to recognition to open and close the debate. In his absence another member shall be designated to open and close debate on the measure.

C. When two or more members rise, the Chair shall name the member who is to speak; but in all cases the member who shall first rise and address the Chair shall speak first.

D. No member shall interrupt another while speaking except to call to order, to correct a mistake or to move the previous question.

E. The sponsor of a measure or the designee shall have three minutes to comment at the opening and three minutes to comment at the closing of debate on an original motion or question except as further provided in this Rule. No other member shall comment more than three minutes in favor of or in opposition to any motion, question or each amendment to the motion or question except as further provided in this Rule. All comments and questions must be relevant to the motion or question.

F. A member shall have three minutes to comment at the opening and three minutes to comment at the closing of debate on any amendment proposed by the member to the original motion or question except as further provided in this Rule.

G. No member other than the member who opens and closes the debate shall comment more than once on any motion, question or each amendment to the motion or question, nor more than the time limits for speaking as provided in this Rule, unless a member desiring to speak more than once, or more than the time limits for speaking is accorded the privilege without objection or upon a motion supported by two-thirds of the members elected to the House.

H. Questions shall be confined to one minute and must be relevant to the motion or question. A member who has been asked a question shall have three minutes to respond.

RULE 19

IMPERMISSIBLE DEBATE

A. No member shall be permitted to indulge in personalities, use language personally offensive, arraign motives of members, charge deliberate misrepresentation or use language tending to hold a member of the House or Senate up to contempt.

B. If any member be called to order for words spoken in debate, the member calling him to order shall repeat the words excepted to; and they shall be taken down in writing at the Chief Clerk's desk and read aloud to the House, but he shall not be held to answer or be subject to the censure of the House therefor if further debate or other business has intervened.

C. If any member, in speaking or otherwise, transgresses the Rules of the House, the Speaker shall, or any member may call him to order, in which case he shall immediately sit down unless permitted to explain; and the House shall, if appealed to, decide the case without debate. If the decision is in favor of the member called to order, he shall be at liberty to proceed, but not otherwise; and, if the case requires it, he shall be liable to censure or such punishment as the House may deem proper.

D. There shall be no debate at the Third Reading or Final Passage of a bill except by a two-thirds vote of the members elected to the House.

RULE 20

PROTEST

A. Any member shall have the right to protest and have the reasons of his protest entered in the Journal (Arizona Constitution, Article IV, Part 2, Section 16) subject to provisions of paragraph B of this Rule. Any member rising to speak on protest shall be allowed to speak for a period not to exceed three minutes. ALL PROTESTS, WHETHER PROCEDURAL OR NOT, SHALL ONLY BE IN WRITING AND SHALL BE SUBMITTED TO THE CHIEF CLERK.

B. The protest of any member, not exceeding 200 words, may be entered in the Journal AT THE REQUEST OF THE MEMBER; but the language thereof shall impute no unworthy motive to any other House or Senate member nor transgress the Rules of the House relating to language used in debate.

RULE 21

MOTIONS

A. When a motion has been made, the Speaker shall state it or if it be in writing cause it to be read aloud by the Chief Clerk before being debated. It shall then be in possession of the House, but may be withdrawn at any time before debate begins or amendment is offered. No motion shall be recognized without the member rising and addressing the Chair.

B. All motions shall be reduced to writing, if requested by the presiding officer or by a member, and shall be entered in the Journal with the name of the member making it, and shall be read before the same shall be debated.

C. No dilatory motion shall be entertained by the Speaker or Chairman.

D. "Privileged Questions" are a class of motions which have the highest precedence.

E. When the question is under debate, no motion shall be received but:

F. These several motions shall have precedence in the foregoing order, and no motion to postpone to a time certain or to refer, being the same day at the same stage of the question decided, shall again be allowed on the motion.

RULE 22

PREVIOUS QUESTION

A. The previous question shall be put in the following form: "Those in favor of ordering the previous question will vote aye; those opposed will vote nay".

B. The motion for the previous question, when agreed to, has the effect of cutting off all debate and bringing the House to a direct vote upon pending amendments, if any, in their order, and then upon the main question, except that after the previous question has been ordered, each side shall be allowed three minutes, the affirmative closing the debate.

C. When the member entitled to speak under this Rule is absent, the member first in order upon the committee reporting the measure, who is present and joined in the report, shall have the right to occupy such time.

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D. After the previous question has been ordered on the passage of a measure, one motion to recommit shall be in order. The previous question is not debatable or amendable and requires a majority of those voting.

RULE 23

RECONSIDERATION

A. When a motion has been made and carried or lost, it shall be in order for any member who voted with the prevailing side, on the same day or the next day of actual session thereafter, to move for the reconsideration thereof at a time not to exceed fourteen days; and such motion shall not be amended and shall be immediately disposed of. Such motion shall take precedence of all other questions except a motion to adjourn or the consideration of a conference report.

B. The motion to reconsider is adopted by an affirmative vote of a majority of those voting, even when the vote reconsidered is on a matter that requires two-thirds or more of those voting for affirmative action. On motion to reconsider, the ayes and nays having been acted on, another motion to reconsider is not in order.

C. No bill, resolution, memorial or petition MEASURE referred to a committee shall be brought back into the House on a motion to reconsider.

D. When a bill, resolution, report, amendment, order or measure, upon which a vote has been taken, shall have gone out of the possession of the House and has been committed to the Senate, the motion to reconsider shall be accompanied by a motion to request the Senate to return the same, which last motion shall be acted upon immediately, and if determined in the negative shall be a final disposition of the motion to reconsider.

RULE 24

DIVISION OF QUESTION

On demand of a member before the question is put, a question shall be divided if it includes propositions so distinct in substance that one being taken away, a substantive proposition shall remain.

RULE 25

PRIVILEGE OF THE HOUSE, PERSONAL PRIVILEGE

A. "Questions of Privilege" are those questions which relate to the rights and privileges of the Body or of its members in their official capacity, and should be distinguished from "privileged questions" which are a class of motions having the highest precedence pursuant to Rule 21.

B. "Questions of Privilege" shall be:

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1. "Privilege of the House" which affects the rights of the House collectively, its safety, dignity and integrity of its proceedings and has the highest precedence.

2. "Personal Privilege" which relates to the rights, reputation and conduct of members individually, in their respective capacity only, and shall have precedence of all other questions except motion to adjourn and except as provided in Rule 7. Any member rising to a point of personal privilege upon being recognized shall first state the point and shall be allowed to speak for a period not to exceed three minutes. All points of personal privilege shall be made at the conclusion of the order of business, unless otherwise directed by the speaker, but points of personal privilege to introduce guests that are confined to one minute may be made at the commencement of each day during the legislative session.

RULE 26

PETITIONS, MEMORIALS AND OTHER COMMUNICATIONS

A. Petitions, memorials or other papers addressed SUBMITTED to the House may be presented by the Speaker or by a member and shall be read and considered in the order presented unless the House shall direct otherwise. The subject matter and the name of the person presenting the petition or other paper shall be endorsed thereon.

B. PETITIONS, MEMORIALS OR REMONSTRANCES SUBMITTED TO THE HOUSE SHALL BE RECEIVED BY THE CHIEF CLERK'S OFFICE AND PLACED ON FILE AS THE FINAL ACTION ON THE PETITION, MEMORIAL OR REMONSTRANCE.

B—C. Messages from the Governor, reports and communications from heads of departments, or other communications to the House, and messages from the Senate, may be referred directly to appropriate committees.

RULE 27

ORDER ON THE FLOOR, PRIVILEGE OF THE FLOOR,

MAIN GALLERY, PRESS GALLERY

A. No member shall be permitted to pass unnecessarily between the Chair and the person speaking, or other persons be permitted to stand in the aisles during the session of the House.

B. Except by unanimous consent, or unless otherwise ordered by a two-thirds vote of the members elected to the House, no person except members, officers and employees of the House shall have the privilege of, or be admitted to, the floor of the House Chambers at any time; provided that the Speaker may grant the privilege of the floor, subject to revocation in any instance by order of the House, to former members of the House and to members of the Senate.

C. The main gallery shall at all times, except when the House is in Executive Session or the House or Speaker shall order the galleries cleared, be open to the public, subject to the full observance of the Rules of the House.

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D. A press gallery shall be maintained, to which shall be admitted only duly accredited representatives of the press holding nontransferable cards issued by the Speaker and revocable at his discretion. The press gallery may be located on the floor of the House at the discretion of the Speaker. Any press representative desiring admission to the press gallery shall make application to the Speaker for a pass and shall accompany such application with a statement of the facts of his press connections, and with a request by the newspaper or newsgathering organization with which he is connected for such pass. Passes shall not be issued to more than four representatives of one newspaper or newsgathering organization, and not more than one such representative at a time shall occupy a seat in the press gallery if such seat is desired by the representative of any other newspaper or newsgathering organization.

RULE 28

THE JOURNAL

A. The House shall keep a Journal of its proceedings, and at the request of two members the ayes and nays on roll call on any question shall be entered (Arizona Constitution, Article IV, Part 2, Section 10).

B. Every motion made to the House and entertained by the Speaker shall be entered in the Journal with the name of the member making it, unless it be withdrawn the same day.

RULE 29

PARLIAMENTARY PRACTICE AND PRECEDENCE

The rules from the different sources take precedence in the order listed:

1. Constitutional Rules or Stipulations

- 2. Adopted House Rules
- 3. Statutory Rules or Provisions
- 4. Customs and Usages

5. Adopted Parliamentary Authority (Mason's Manual of Legislative Procedure, Rules of United States House of Representatives, and Jefferson's Manual)

6. General Parliamentary Law

RULE 30

EXECUTIVE SESSION

Upon a motion, carried by a majority vote of all members elected to the House, the House may resolve itself into Executive Session for the discussion of any business which may, in the opinion of the House membership, require secrecy. The Speaker may direct the chambers and galleries to be cleared, except such personnel as the Speaker may deem necessary; and during the discussion the doors shall remain closed. While in Executive Session the Rules of the House shall apply.

RULE 31

SUSPENSION OR AMENDMENT OF THE RULES

A. The House Rules may be amended upon vote of the majority of the members of the House AND MUST INCLUDE THE SPEAKER OF THE HOUSE IN THAT MAJORITY.

B. The House Rules may be suspended by a UPON vote of a THE majority of the members present-OF THE HOUSE AND MUST INCLUDE THE SPEAKER OF THE HOUSE IN THAT MAJORITY.

RULE 32

AGENDAS, CALENDARS AND NOTICE OF MEETINGS

A. Agendas and calendars shall contain the number and short titles of all legislative measures to be considered.

B. A standing, interim or joint committee or a subcommittee, except the Committee on Rules, shall not take action on a legislative measure unless the measure has been on a committee agenda which was available at the Information Desk by 5:00 p.m. on the previous day. Standing Committees are also subject to Rule 9 C. Interim committees shall prepare and distribute agendas no later than 5:00 p.m. on the second previous working day, excluding Saturday, Sundays and holidays, in advance of the committee meeting.

C. A measure not considered by the Committee of the Whole on the same legislative day as it was reported out of the last standing committee to which it is assigned, other than the Committee on Rules, shall not be considered by the Committee of the Whole unless it appeared on an active calendar of the Committee of the Whole which was available at the Information Desk on the previous day.

D. A measure not disposed of on Third Reading on the same legislative day as it was reported by the Committee of the Whole shall not be brought to a vote on Third Reading unless it appeared on a calendar available at the Information Desk on the previous day.

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E. The names of the House conferees appointed to a Conference Committee shall be available at the Information Desk before the conference report is signed. The report of a Conference Committee shall not be adopted unless the report was available at the Information Desk prior to the adoption.

F. In case of an emergency, a vote may be taken upon such notice as is appropriate to the circumstances. A report of the action taken in an emergency shall be available at the Information Desk within twenty-four hours.

G. A current report of the House action on all measures shall be available to public inspection at the Information Desk.

H. Pursuant to Article IV, Part 2, Section 8, Constitution of Arizona, the meeting notice and agenda requirements for the House, Committee of the Whole and all standing, select and joint committees and subcommittees shall be governed exclusively by these rules.

RULE 33

CODE OF ETHICS

A. No member shall:

1. Intentionally solicit, accept or agree to accept from any source, whether directly or indirectly and whether by himself or through any other person, any personal financial benefit, including any gift for himself or another, upon an agreement or understanding that his vote, opinion, judgment, exercise of discretion or other action as a public official will thereby be influenced.

2. Disclose or use information designated by law as confidential in any manner prohibited by law.

3. Knowingly disclose or use, other than in the performance of his official duties, information gained as a result of his official position and which is not available to the general public, for his personal financial benefit or the financial benefit of any other person, including compensation from any employment, transaction or investment entered into that utilizes or is based upon such information.

4. Enter into any contract with a public agency or have an interest in the profits or benefits of a contract entered into with a public agency by any other person or entity, unless:

or

(a) The total gross annual income value of the contract is less than one thousand dollars,

(b) The contract is entered into by a business of which the member, his spouse or any minor child of whom the member has custody, owns or controls, individually or combined, less than ten percent thereof, or

(c) The contract has been awarded through public and competitive bidding pursuant to law, or

(d) The subject of the contract between a member and a public agency is an appointment or employment for which an exception exists pursuant to Article IV, Part 2, Section 4 or 5 of the Constitution of Arizona.

5. Appear for a fee on behalf of another person or entity before any public agency for the purpose of influencing such agency by use of threat to initiate or take an action in the discharge of his official duties that would be adverse to such agency.

B. For the purposes of this Rule:

1. A member shall be deemed to "have an interest in the profits of a contract" if the contract is entered into by the member or the member's spouse or any minor child of whom the member has legal custody.

2. "Public agency" means all courts and any department, agency, board, commission, institution or instrumentality of this state but does not include counties, cities and towns or any other political subdivision.

3. "Business" includes any corporation, partnership, joint venture, sole proprietorship, business trust, enterprise, organization, trade, occupation or profession.

4. "Gift" includes any gratuity, special discount, favor, service, economic opportunity, loan or other benefit received without lawful consideration and not provided to members of the public at large but does not include political campaign contributions if such contributions are publicly reported as required by law.

5. "Fee" includes any compensation but does not include benefits received pursuant to law as a result of being a legislator.

RULE 34

PERSONAL FINANCIAL INTEREST

A. A member who anticipates taking an action in the discharge of his official duties in which he may have a personal financial interest shall:

1. Prepare a written statement describing the matter to be acted upon and the nature of the potential interest; and

2. Deliver a copy of the statement to the Speaker, the chairman of the Ethics Committee and the Chief Clerk. Such statement shall be retained by the Chief Clerk as a public record.

B. A member shall report a potential personal financial interest pursuant to subsection A as soon as the member is aware of such potential interest. If, however, such awareness occurs when the House is convened on the floor or during a meeting of a committee, subcommittee or caucus, a member shall report a potential personal financial interest as soon after the adjournment of that body as is practicable.

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C. A member may abstain from taking any action in which he has a personal financial interest. Upon declining to participate in any legislative action on the floor, in committee or in subcommittee, the member shall state his decision and such decision shall be recorded in the Journal or minutes of that body. Prior to declining to vote in any legislative action on the floor, a member must first prepare a written statement describing the nature of the personal financial interest or the reason why the member is declining to vote and deliver the statement to the Office of the Chief Clerk and the office of the Speaker. If the member fails to file the statement prior to the member's declaration on the floor, the member shall be subject to Rule 14 E.

D. A member in doubt as to the propriety of any action proposed to be taken by him and involving a potential personal financial interest under this Rule may request the Ethics Committee to render an advisory opinion on the facts. The advisory opinion shall be issued not later than 5 days from the date of receipt of that request and be filed with the Speaker, the chairman of the Ethics Committee and the Chief Clerk. Such opinion shall be retained by the Chief Clerk as a public record.

E. For the purposes of this Rule:

1. "An action in the discharge of his official duties" means introduction, sponsorship, debate, amendment, passage, defeat, approval, consideration or any other official action on any bill, resolution, memorial MEASURE, amendment, confirmation, nomination, appointment, report or any other matter pending or proposed in a committee, subcommittee, caucus or on the floor of the House.

2. A personal financial interest exists if it is reasonably foreseeable that an action in the discharge of his official duties will have a material financial benefit or detriment either directly or indirectly on the member, his spouse or any minor child of whom he has legal custody, except that no personal financial interest exists if the legislator or such member of his household is a member of a class of persons and it reasonably appears that a majority of the total membership of that class is to be affected by such action.

RULE 35

POLITICAL PARTY CAUCUSES

All meetings of majority or minority political party caucuses of members of the House shall be open to the public except organizational meetings to elect officers of the caucus and the House and meetings to discuss matters, including those permitted in executive session as set forth in A.R.S. section 38-431.03. Each caucus shall establish procedures for convening political party caucuses.

RULE 36

DISCHARGE OF COMMITTEES

Notwithstanding any other provision of these rules to the contrary:

1. Every bill, resolution and memorial MEASURE shall be referred to one or more standing committees, except death resolutions and Senate bills to be substituted on Third Reading pursuant to Rule 7(C).

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2. Except as provided in paragraph 3, if three-fifths or more of the members of the House sign a petition to discharge all committees from further consideration of a bill, resolution, memorial-MEASURE the measure shall be placed on an Active Calendar of the Committee of the Whole within one week unless the House adjourns sine die. If the measure is reported favorably by the Committee of the Whole it shall be brought for Third Reading.

3. If three-fifths or more of the members of the House sign a removal request, a bill, resolution, memorial-MEASURE shall, irrespective of the measure's status, be removed from the possession of the Rules committee and shall be placed on an Active Calendar of the Committee of the Whole within one week unless the House adjourns sine die.

RULE 37

CODE OF CONDUCT

A. The House shall have a written code of conduct applicable to members. This code of conduct shall be adopted, and may be amended, upon vote of the majority of the members of the House.

B. The House shall have a written harassment prevention policy applicable to member behavior. This policy shall be adopted, and may be amended, upon vote of the majority of the members of the House.

RULE 38

PROCEDURE ON RECORDS RETENTION AND DESTRUCTION SCHEDULE

A. Definitions. In this rule the following definitions apply:

1. "Bill file" means a file containing materials relating to legislation as determined by the Chief Clerk.

2. "Custodian" means any legislator, legislative staff member, legislative intern or legislative contractor who has primary custody and control over a record.

3. "Personnel records" means an employee's official record and documentation of the employee's employment.

4. "Record" means all books, papers, maps, photographs or other documentary materials, regardless of physical form or characteristics, including prints or copies of such items produced or reproduced on film or electronic media, made or received in pursuance of law or in connection with the transaction of public or legislative business and over which the custodian has custody and control and that is preserved or appropriate for preservation by the House as evidence of the organization, functions, policies, decisions, procedures, operations or other activities of the custodian, or because of the informational and historical value of data contained in the record.

5. "Reference value" means administrative, legal, fiscal, research or historical value as reasonably determined by the custodian.

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6. "State Library, Archives and Public Records (LAPR)" means the division of the Arizona Secretary of State that is the archives for Arizona state government, which is mandated by law to collect, preserve and make available to the public and all branches of government, permanent public records, historical manuscripts, photographs, and other materials that contribute to the understanding of Arizona history.

B. Authority. Arizona Constitution Article IV, part 2, section 8 authorizes the Legislature to determine its ownrules of procedure which supersede any conflicting statutes.

C. General Provisions.

1. Permanent records. As set forth below, at the end of the retention period with the Legislature, the Chief Clerk or the Chief Clerk's designee must transfer to LAPR all records kept by the Chief Clerk, regardless of format, that have a retention period designated as permanent, unless otherwise instructed by LAPR. The Chief Clerk shall work with LAPR's established requirements for transfer.

2. Electronic records. At the end of the retention period set forth below, the custodian shall destroy electronic items not designated as having a retention period of permanent.

3. Paper files, records, and documents. At the end of the retention period set forth below, the Chief Clerk may destroy files that are primarily in paper format and may destroy other records, regardless of format, not designated as having a retention period of permanent.

4. No duty to migrate to new technology. The Chief Clerk is not responsible for migrating to new technology any record that is recorded in a format, such as CD and DVD, that must be read by a computer.

5. Destruction of non-permanent records. When a paper record is eligible for destruction, the custodian shall take proper precautions to destroy the entire file, record or document by shredding, burning or pulverizing it. Electronic records shall be deleted from all electronic repositories in which they reside, including servers and hard drives. The custodian may keep a list, containing minimal information, capturing any destroyed items, so that the custodian knows that it has been destroyed and has not been merely misplaced or never existed.

6. Effective date. The provisions of this Rule are applicable to files, records and documents created before or after the adoption of this rule.

D. Interpretation and Enforcement. The maintenance, preservation and destruction of records will be governed solely and exclusively by the provisions of this Rule. Any questions or disputes concerning the application of this Rule to any specific record or subset of records will be resolved by the Speaker, whose determination will be final. The provisions of this Rule will be enforced solely and exclusively by the House in accordance with the Rules of the Arizona House of Representatives.

E. Retention and Disposition Schedule. The following records retention periods are finite and absolute. They are *not* minimum retention periods or guidelines. Records may be kept beyond their designated retention periods only if they are relevant to any (1) ongoing administrative or litigation proceeding in which the House or the custodian is a party or the recipient of a third party subpoena or (2) pending or prospective administrative or litigation proceeding in which the House it may become a party, or if the custodian believes the record has continuing reference value.

Today I vetoed SB 1523, along with the twelve other FY2024 budget bills that were transmitted to my office.

Five weeks ago, I stood before the legislature and, invoking the words of the late Governor Rose Mofford, asked the members to work with me in making "difficult choices" about the future of our state. I spoke about the need to address Arizona's housing crisis, to make college more affordable, to put money back in the pockets of working families, and to truly invest in public education.

Four days later, I delivered a budget proposal to the legislature that makes meaningful progress on these exact issues. As rent and housing prices have skyrocketed, my budget includes a historic investment in the Housing Trust Fund to help keep people in their homes and off the street. As everyday costs have increased and strained household budgets, I proposed a plan to put more money into the pockets of working families. As cutting-edge companies relocate to Arizona, my budget makes major investments in college scholarships and dual enrollment programs, to ensure we're preparing our students for the jobs of the future. And, perhaps above all else, my budget makes it clear that for as long as I'm Governor, Arizona will prioritize investment in public education.

Along with these immediate investments, my budget proposal puts a quarter of a billion dollars in the Rainy Day Fund, and leaves a quarter of a billion dollars on the table to ensure a healthy structural balance.

Unfortunately, despite my call to take on these difficult choices and protect our state's future, the budget approved by a slim, partisan majority in the legislature takes another path. An easy path. Rather than tackling difficult choices, this budget presents Arizonans with false choices.

This purely-partisan budget says that we can't invest in our state now and invest in our future. It says that we can't address the challenges of today and save for the challenges of tomorrow. It says that as Democrats and Republicans, we can't disagree with each other and work together in the best interest of the state.

I reject these false choices because I'm an optimist, particularly when it comes to Arizona. I'm confident that we can work together on a budget that addresses our state's housing crisis, lowers costs, prepares our workforce, and invests in public education. I know that the people of Arizona didn't send us here to do the easy thing. They sent us here to do the right thing.

As we move forward this legislative session, I hope that all elected officials-regardless of party affiliation-will remain open to bipartisan discussion, solutions, and compromise. The people of Arizona demand it. So let's get to work.

Re: SB 1184

President Petersen,

I have vetoed SB 1184. I appreciate the legislature's interest in addressing rising housing costs, particularly for renters. Lowering costs for Arizona families is a priority of my administration. Unfortunately, this bill suffers from two important defects at this time.

First, this bill lacks any enforceable mechanism to ensure relief will be provided to renters. As noted by the legislature's own attorney, provisions in the bill that purport to require that tax savings be passed on to renters face challenges under both the state and federal constitutions. If we are going to promise relief to renters, it's important that we are able to ensure they actually receive it. For working families faced with ever-increasing rental prices, this proposal just doesn't fit the bill.

Second, the bill includes an appropriation of roughly 270 million dollars over the next eighteen months. To approve of such an appropriation outside of a comprehensive budget agreement would be irresponsible. If the majority caucus is committed to such an appropriation, I expect that it will be brought to bipartisan budget negotiations for consideration.

Re: SB 1248,

President Petersen,

Today, I vetoed SB 1248.

I appreciate the legislature's interest in the scope of practice expansion and agree that we need to make the sunrise application process more effective, efficient, and fair. However, repealing the sunrise application for scope of practice expansion altogether without replacing it with a better mechanism will not address the underlying issues, and poses a threat to the health and safety of Arizonans.

The sunrise application process for scope expansions provides the legislature, health care practitioners, and the public an opportunity to weigh in on potential scope of practice expansions. As a legislator, I sat on the Committee of Reference that reviews scope of practice expansions for providers and know how powerful this Committee can be when our legislators engage fully and openly in the process.

Scope of practice expansions are serious matters that should be considered with a critical eye to preserve the health and safety of our constituents. Some expansions provide authority to prescribe dangerous and/or addictive substances, to perform medical procedures, or to practice medicine with less supervision. Some are much more mundane, but that does not mean that they should not be held to some level of scientific and public health scrutiny.

Without the sunrise application process, provider groups could fast-track their priorities through the legislative process without adequate attention to why the change is necessary, or if it will impact communities with the greatest needs.

While I am vetoing this effort to do away with the sunrise process altogether, I am committed to working with the legislature and our healthcare provider communities to identify an alternative pathway toward scope of practice expansion. I hear the concerns of providers hoping to expand care in communities where it is most needed, and I am committed to helping promote a culture of health in Arizona.

It's clear that there is an imbalance of power between high-level and low-level providers, and that the current structure of our boards and commissions does not provide equal weight to their professional and financial interests. I welcome ideas to rebalance and right-size our regulatory boards and commissions, as well as policy solutions that will reduce the regulatory and administrative burden on health care provider groups.

We can and we should work together to identify health policy opportunities that will promote equitable access to care.

And then last week we all started getting the emails by the hundreds, all using the same form, all saying the same thing. They threatened retribution if anyone at the Legislature takes any action to hold Representative Harris accountable.

As a member of this body, who was duly elected, I, for one, will not be intimidated.

Representative Liz Harris has engaged in disorderly conduct in violation of House Rule 1 and has facilitated many counts of defamation against members of this Chamber as well as other elected officials and city employees. As a result, Representative Harris has damaged the reputation of the Arizona House of Representatives by her actions. Without objection, the reading of the Journal of Tuesday, April 11, 2023, was dispensed with and approved as written.

PERSONAL PRIVILEGE

Member Longdon introduced the Doctor of the Day, Dr. Kiana Espinosa from Legislative District 5.

Member Ortiz introduced members of Rural Arizona Engagement, guests who were seated in the gallery.

Member Carter introduced Nancy Fleming, guest who was seated in the gallery.

Speaker Pro Tempore Grantham announced that, without objection, the report of the Committee on Ethics as listed on the Calendar would not be read. The report was entered in the Journal and be placed on the Active Calendar.

The Committee on Ethics submitted the following report:

ARIZONA HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON ETHICS - APRIL 11, 2023

MR. SPEAKER,

Your Committee on Ethics ("Committee") has considered the Ethics Complaint ("Complaint") filed on March 6, 2023, by Representative Stephanie Stahl Hamilton against Representative Liz Han-is, which is premised on Representative Han-is's conduct relating to Jacqueline Breger's testimony before the House and Senate Special Joint Elections Committee on February 23, 2023.

This Report summarizes the Committee's investigation and factual findings. The Committee unanimously concludes that Representative Han-is committed disorderly behavior, thereby violating Rule 1 of the Rules of the Arizona House of Representatives and damaging the institutional integrity of the House.

Consistent with the text of the Arizona Constitution, *see* Ariz. Const. art. 4, part 2, § 11 (empowering the House to "punish its members for disorderly behavior"), and because Representative Harris's violation of Rule 1 occurred in connection with the legislative process and procedures, the Committee refers this Report to the House to determine what disciplinary measures should be taken.

I. <u>BACKGROUND</u>

On February 23, 2023, some members of the Senate Elections Committee and of the House Municipal Oversight & Elections Committee held a Special Joint Hearing ("Joint Hearing") in the Senate building, consisting of presentations related to election integrity by pre-selected individuals. *See Ethics Hearing Exhibit 4*. The Joint Hearing was conducted at the request and organization of Representative Harris, who had submitted her proposal for the five-hour hearing to House and Senate Leadership. *See Ethics Hearing Exhibit 3*. The purpose of the Joint Hearing, in Representative Harris's own words, was "to ensure that the voters of Arizona are confident for all future elections." *Joint Hearing Video* at 02:05:14.

During the hearing, Representative Harris asked for, and received, permission to deviate from the order of the set agenda to better accommodate her guests' travel schedules and introduced witnesses. *See, e.g., Joint Hearing Video* at 52:35, 04:03:30. Representative Harris herself also gave a presentation during that hearing entitled, "The People Speak' & Testimonial Highlights." *Id.* at 02:04:20.

The final presentation scheduled for the day was entitled, "Preliminary Findings of Activities Impacting Arizona's Election Integrity' (with specific focus on the 2020 & 2022 General Elections)." Unlike the other presentations given that day, this one was given by a constituent from Scottsdale, Jacqueline Breger, who purported to present findings of an investigation conducted by the Harris/Thaler Law Firm, at which she is a principal investigator. *Id.* at 04:04:50. Before Breger began her presentation, Representative Harris secured permission from Senator Wendy Rogers, the Chair of the Joint Hearing, to "sub[stitute] as Vice-Chair" for Representative Alexander Kolodin, who briefly stepped out of the hearing room. *Id.* at 04:03:25.

Breger's presentation alleged the existence of numerous schemes that encompass money laundering, drug trafficking and sales, public corruption, bribing of public officials, and election fraud. *See Presentation Handout; Joint Hearing Video* at 04:07:45. Throughout her presentation, Breger repeatedly referred to a large, unnumbered handout that was distributed to the Joint Committee members, which included a table entitled, "Elected and Appointed Officials with Falsified Deeds." The table named several private citizens, government employees, and public officials, including the House Speaker, alleging that they had falsified deeds. Breger unequivocally and repeatedly accused many government officials of criminal conduct, stating, for example:

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- "Bribes and infiltration have been used to affect the outcome of the races" in the November 2020 and 2022 General Elections, and "public officials who have received bribes include multi state office holders, state House and state Senate, local office holders, county supervisors, judges in the Maricopa Supreme Court [sic], judges of some city courts including two presiding judges, judges' assistants, prosecutors within certain cities within Maricopa County, prosecutors for Maricopa County, peripheral legal specialists including attorneys, approved mental health care providers as in court-appointed advisors, and related specialists." *Joint Hearing Video* at 04:16:30-04:17:22.
- "In Arizona, public officials accepting bribes include members of the Legislature..." *Joint Hearing Video* at 04:38:40.

Breger repeatedly directed the committee members to review the table. Breger's handout asserted that the Speaker was "just one of many state legislators with documents evidencing the acceptance of bribes through the phony mortgage scheme." *See Presentation Handout.* Among other claims, Breger also asserted that the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-Day Saints "control[s]" government agencies and has been "integral to the laundering activities." *Id.*

About 30 minutes into Breger's presentation, Senator Ken Bennett made a point of order, stating that the legislative committee hearing was not the appropriate place to make the sort of allegations that Breger's presentation made. *Joint Hearing Video* at 04:38:55. Representative Kolodin added that the House Rules prohibited impugning Members' motives. *Id.* at 04:39:10. Breger continued her presentation, after which Senator Bennett asked how she was invited to speak at the hearing. *Id.* at 04:45:09. Breger replied that Representative Harris had invited her, and then Representative Harris made a gesture moving her hand across her neck and mouthed something to Breger. *Id.* at 04:45:23. Representative Harris subsequently stated that she hoped that the hearing was being presented by all national networks. *Id.* at 04:46:10.

A few days after the hearing, Senator Rogers issued a press release stating,"[a]ny claims as serious as those presented [at the hearing] should have been immediately turned in to Arizona law enforcement officials and not brought before the Legislature." *See* Ariz. Senate Press Release, "Statement on Presentation Given by House Representative Liz Harris During Last Week's Election Meeting" (Feb. 26, 2023).

II. ETHICS COMMITTEE PROCEEDINGS

Complaint and Response

On March 6, 2023, Representative Stahl Hamilton filed the Complaint against Representative Harris in connection with the Joint Hearing and specifically the presentation by Breger, whom the Complaint alleged was "personally invited" by Representative Harris. *Complaint* at p. 1. The Complaint further alleged that Representative Harris's invitation of Breger and her presentation brought "disrepute and embarrassment to the House of Representatives" and "allowed the impugning of other members," therefore constituting a violation of House Rule 1. *Id.* Accordingly, the Complaint requested that this Committee investigate Representative Harris's actions and decision to invite Breger to present at the Joint Hearing. *Id.* at pp. 2-3.

Pursuant to the House Ethics Committee Rule of Procedure 13, the Committee provided Representative Harris with an opportunity to respond to the complaint in writing. She did so, submitting the amended and operative version on March 17, 2023. In it, Representative Harris notably did not state that she was unaware that Breger would present what she did at the hearing. Instead, Representative Harris wrote that she "set forth to allow for anyone with information regarding our elections to present said information," "brought forth witnesses who had testimony to share, without endorsing, confirming, or denying the allegations presented," and that it was "not [her] duty to endorse or negate/confirm" the claims. *See Updated Response* at pp. 1, 2. Representative Harris also denied that she had engaged in disorderly conduct in violation of House Rule 1, citing to a federal regulation definition of "disorderly conduct." *Id.* at p. 1.

Rule 15 Evidentiary Hearing

On March 23, 2023, the Committee convened and formally adopted Rules of Procedure. On March 30, 2023, the Committee held an evidentiary hearing open to the public and press pursuant to Rule 15 of the Committee's Rules of Procedure. In anticipation of that hearing, Representative Harris submitted a list of 14 exhibits for the Committee's consideration. Of those 14 exhibits, which included links to videos about election integrity, the Chairman concluded that four of Representative Harris's exhibits were relevant and would be considered by the members at the evidentiary hearing:

- 1. The Constitution of Arizona
- 2. Joint Hearing Proposal
- 3. Handwritten Agenda
- 4. Special Joint Meeting Agenda of the Senate Committee on Elections and the House Committee on Municipal Oversight & Elections

The Chairman also provided the Committee members with links to three additional exhibits that Representative Harris submitted-all to legislative videos-but did not play them during the evidentiary hearing in the interest of time and to avoid unnecessary repetition:

- 1. A video of Representative Stahl Hamilton making statements on the House Floor about Representative Harris
- 2. A video of the House members' vote explanations on HB 2754 in a committee hearing
- 3. A 28-minute video containing clips of "testimony highlights," which appeared to be a collection of video clips from legislative hearings

Additionally, the Committee considered a series of screenshots of an apparent text-message conversation between Representative Harris, Breger, and another individual, John Thaler, and marked these messages as Exhibit 5. Although the screen shots were left anonymously on the House Majority General Counsel's desk in an envelope, the Chairman determined that the messages were relevant and could be considered by the Committee, despite the unusual circumstances under which the Committee received the evidence.

At the evidentiary hearing, Representative Harris confirmed that the screenshots in Exhibit

5 were her text messages. *See House Ethics Hearing Video* at 12:30. Critically, the text conversation among Representative Harris, Breger, and Thaler spans the days immediately before and after the Joint Hearing, relating to the planning of Breger's presentation and subsequent reactions to it.

Finally, the Committee carefully considered Representative Harris' s testimony during the evidentiary hearing, including her responses to Committee members' questions, her presentation of evidence, and her closing statement.

III. COMMITTEE'S FINDINGS OF FACT

As the Chairman emphasized at the evidentiary hearing, the sole issue for the Committee's consideration is whether Representative Harris violated House Rule 1, which prohibits members from engaging in disorderly behavior. In undertaking that inquiry, the Committee makes the following factual findings, accompanied by the Committee's reasoning to support each finding.

1. THE COMMITTEE FINDS that Breger made criminal allegations during the Joint Hearing and REJECTS Representative Harris's testimony that no direct criminal allegations were made during the Joint Hearing.

Representative Harris's testimony (*see House Ethics Hearing Video* at 44:49) 1s contradicted by the legislative record. *See supra*, Section I.

2. THE COMMITTEE FINDS that, prior to the Joint Hearing, Representative Harris knew or was at least aware that Breger would present criminal allegations at the Joint Hearing and REJECTS Representative Harris's testimony to the contrary.

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In response to a question asking Representative Harris whether she knew that Breger would "present the information that she presented in that special elections hearing," Representative Harris responded, "absolutely, positively, one-hundred percent, no." *House Ethics Hearing Video* at 13:14.

Exhibit 5 (the text messages) is particularly insightful on this point and significantly undermines Representative Harris's testimony that she was unaware of the information that would be presented or that she was "surprised" by it at the time of the Joint Meeting as she claimed that she was. *See, e.g., House Ethics Hearing Video* at 32:10. To be sure, when Representative Harris asked Breger for a title for the presentation, Breger responded, "We are trying to think of something that won't raise a red flag." *Ethics Hearing Exhibit 5* at p. 2. Although Representative Harris testified that she had "no idea" what that meant (*see House Ethics Hearing Video* at 15:15), her alleged confusion-or any concern about what in the presentation might raise such a flag that they would want to avoid-was not reflected in her reply to Breger. Instead, Representative Harris expressed concern only that Breger's suggestion was not as vague as she believed it was and would "draw the wrong press." *Ethics Hearing Exhibit 5* at p. 2.

Notably, the subsequent text messages indicate that Representative Harris believed that this particular presentation would be the subject of multiple interviews after the Joint Hearing; stated differently, the text suggests that Representative Harris knew the presentation's contents would pique heightened interests. *Ethics Hearing Exhibit 5* at p. 5.

Additionally, Representative Harris testified that she had become aware of Breger from a press release about Thaler's forthcoming book-the same book that Breger had testified was the culmination of their investigation's findings on the alleged "deed scheme" and alleged briberies that she was presenting about. *Joint Hearing Video* at 04:10:00.

Representative Harris also testified that she had spent more than two hours with Breger just four days before the special meeting, looking at her "eyeball to eyeball," listening to her story, and even crying together over the circumstances. *House Ethics Hearing Video* at O1:20:50. Over the next four days, the evidence shows that Representative Harris had at least one phone can (*see House Ethics Hearing Video* at 31:25), two online virtual meetings (*see Ethics Hearing Exhibit 5* at p. 1), and an on-going group text with Breger and Thaler (*see generally, Ethics Hearing Exhibit 5*).

The Committee also questioned Representative Harris about a lunch that Representative Harris attended in January-weeks before the Joint Hearing-with a former employee of the Arizona Attorney General's Office. *House Ethics Hearing Video* at 36:23, 38:00. Representative Harris admitted that the lunch occurred, although she appeared to dispute some of the particulars that occurred at the lunch. *Id.* at 38:35-39:08. Significantly, Representative Harris did not dispute that discussion of an alleged "deed scheme" occurred at the lunch. *Id.* This indicates that Representative Harris was aware of the criminal allegations relating to an alleged "deed scheme"- the precise subject of Breger's testimony at the Joint Hearing-at least several weeks before it.

Representative Harris appeared careful to state that she did not know that the bribery claims would be in the handout, but her testimony otherwise supports an inference that she was aware of the findings of the Harris/Thaler investigation, including allegations of bribery of elected officials, and that they would be mentioned during Breger's presentation. Indeed, despite maintaining that she was prepared for Breger to present information on only boxes of ballots and backdoor portal access, Representative Harris later testified, inconsistently, that she knew that Breger would talk about the deed scheme during the Joint Meeting. *House Ethics Hearing Video* at 35:38.

Representative Harris also testified that she instructed Breger to not "impugn any member of the House [or Senate]" or to bring up "any religious institution." *House Ethics Hearing Video* at 31:20. The fact that Representative Harris knew to make that admonition, specifically about those two items, further supp01 is an inference that she knew of their inclusion in Breger's presentation. In other words, that Representative Harris believed it necessary to make those requests of Breger suggests that she-at the very least-- had reason to believe that they could be included in the presentation.

3. THE COMMITTEE FINDS that Representative Harris took steps to avoid compliance with internal House deadlines, which required disclosure of Breger's presentation in advance of the Joint Hearing.

The text messages regarding the provision of the presentation materials further support an inference that Representative Harris took steps to prevent disclosure as required by internal House deadlines. Specifically, Representative Harris communicated to Breger that all "electronically formatted presentations" needed to be sent to Speaker Toma by the following day-Wednesday, February 22-and "[f]or that reason," Representative Harris suggested that Breger pass out physical handouts at the Joint Hearing on Thursday instead. *Ethics Hearing Exhibit 5* at p. 5.

Representative Harris testified that she had told each of the presenters, not just Breger, to bring paper handouts if they could not submit electronic presentations to her by noon the following day. *House Ethics Hearing Video* at 16:50, 17:13. But the noon deadline was not mentioned in the text messages. Moreover, Representative Harris testified-inconsistently-that she had expected Breger's materials to consist of a short affidavit instead of the lengthy, unnumbered handout that Breger brought to the Joint Hearing. *Id.* at 30:30-31:12; 01:23:25. Representative Harris's inconsistent testimony leads the Committee to believe that she had a more detailed understanding of Breger's presentation than she led the Joint Elections Committee to believe, *and* that Representative Harris had hoped to avoid providing the presentation to House leadership before the hearing.

4. THE COMMITTEE FINDS that Representative Harris was not surprised or upset by Breger's testimony and REJECTS Representative Harris's testimony to the contrary.

Representative Harris testified that she had believed that Breger' s presentation would relate to only two nalTow topics related to Arizona's recent election. But the text messages exchanged soon after Breger' s presentation show no surprise at the fact that the presentation actually related to a wholly different topic. *See Ethics Hearing Exhibit 5* at pp. 14-15. Representative HalTis wrote that she knew that the Joint Elections Committee would shut down the presentation, and that doing so took the committee "longer than [she] thought" it would. *Id.* These messages show that not only was Representative Harris *not* taken by surprise by the presentation or "shocked" by the inclusion of the table naming persons alleged to have accepted bribes (*see House Ethics Hearing Video* at 31:10), but that she *expected* the precise reception that it received.

Representative Harris testified that her texts referred to her belief that the two subjects she understood would be presented alone would have caused great upset. *House Ethics Hearing Video* at 23:40. However, she testified that by this, she meant that she believed those subjects would have prompted more questioning and engagement from the Joint Elections Committee for clarification purposes, *not* a "shut down." *Id.* at 23:44.

Additionally, Representative Harris did not express surprise, either during the Joint Hearing or afterward in her text messages with Breger, about the verbal accusation that "members of the Legislature" were accepting bribes. Nor did she express surprise during the Joint Hearing or afterward in the text messages, about the naming of a sitting member of the House of Representatives and the entire Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-Day Saints in the handout that was distributed to the Joint Elections Committee members.

5. THE COMMITTEE FINDS that, as the primary organizer of the Joint Hearing and the acting Vice Chair during Breger's presentation, Representative Harris violated the inherent obligation to protect the integrity of the House.

Finally, the Committee notes that even if the Committee were to take at face value Representative Harris's testimony that she was unaware of the contents of Breger's presentation *and* that she had specifically instructed Breger to *not* impugn any legislator, Representative Harris did nothing during the Joint Hearing to address her statements.

By her own admission, Representative Harris had obvious influence and significant control over the Joint Hearing as its organizer and facilitator. With Senator Rogers's approval, Representative Harris also acted as Vice Chair during Breger's presentation. Representative Harris did not interrupt Breger while Representative Harris's colleagues were trying to follow Breger's testimony and reviewing the large, unnumbered handout. Senator Bennett, who was the first to call a point of order regarding the propriety of Breger's presentation, was neither the Chair nor Vice Chair. The absence of any action or reaction by Representative Harris further undermines her testimony that she was oblivious of what Breger would present.

Although Representative Harris disputed that Breger's presentation contained criminal allegations against any specific person, she also conceded that a legislative hearing is not the proper forum to make such serious allegations. Yet the totality of the evidence shows that Representative Harris used her elected position to provide Breger with a legislative platform as a substitute for a criminal court.

As Representative Harris stated in a text message reply to Breger about the hearing: "It was all how it was intended to be." *Ethics Hearing Exhibit 5* at p. 16.

IV. CONCLUSION AND SUMMARY OF FINDINGS

The Arizona Constitution empowers the House to establish its own rules of procedure. See Ariz. Const. art. 4, part 2, § 8. The House Rules, which the House adopted at the beginning of the first regular session of the 56^{th} Legislature, expressly confirm that House Rules are subject only to constitutional rules and take precedence over statutory rules or provisions, customs and usages, or other parliamentary authority. See House Rule 29. Accordingly, it is incumbent on the Ethics Committee to thoroughly review any Complaint by any member to determine whether a member has violated a House Rule.

The Committee's investigation required significant time and legislative resources. The Committee does not lightly issue this Report, but the findings herein are necessary to protect the integrity of the House and House Rules.

This Report should not be construed as any comment on individuals' constitutional rights, including the right to freely speak guaranteed by the Arizona Constitution. House Rules have long required members, the public, and the press to maintain proper decorum. Although the Committee has held meetings open to the public and press, the Complaint at issue ultimately presents an internal House matter for the Committee alone to investigate. What the House Rules cannot tolerate is a member engaging in the conduct described above, which erodes public trust in the legislative process.

Pursuant to its investigation and its factual findings above, the Committee finds that the evidence sufficiently supports a conclusion that Representative Harris engaged in disorderly behavior in violation of Rule 1 of the Arizona House of Representatives.

The Committee notes that its findings are uniquely fact-intensive and require a subjective assessment of Representative Harris's credibility. Accordingly, the Committee recommends that all members of the House fully examine this Report and the legislative material cited herein. The Committee agrees, unanimously, that Representative Harris did violate Rule 1. Based on this finding, and because Representative Harris's violation of Rule 1 occurred in connection with the legislative process and procedures, the Committee deems it appropriate for the House as a whole to decide what disciplinary measures should be taken.

Motion by Member Martinez that the report of the Committee of the Whole be adopted and the bills be properly assigned. Carried.

Ensuring the safety of our students is a responsibility that belongs to all of us. Since taking office, I have met with gun safety advocates to discuss acts of preventable gun violence happening in our schools, colleges, and universities.

Mandatory firearm safety training in schools is not the solution to gun violence prevention. This requirement could lead to immediate and long-term impacts on the health and wellbeing of students, teachers, and parents. Nor is it prudent to allow parents to carry concealed weapons on school campuses. Allowing more guns on campus will not make a campus safer. Firearms on campus have the potential to confuse law enforcement as they arrive at an active shooter situation.

I'm focused on finding concrete solutions to gun violence prevention that protect Arizona families, including but not limited to, policy focused on trauma-informed emergency planning and safe, secure gun storage.

This session, Representative Jennifer Longdon introduced HB 2192, also known as Christian's Law. The bill would have required gun owners to keep either ammunition or guns in a locked storage container or in a device that would render them inoperable without a combination or a key. The majority party decided to not give HB 2192 a hearing in committee.

Though the bill was amended to relieve the Attorney General of the duty to defend the constitutionality of state laws if she provides notice to the Legislature at least 10 days before any substantive or dispositive filing is due, there are often cases in which such filings are due in less than 10 days (e.g., expedited election cases or preliminary injunction deadlines).

The Attorney General, like other elected officials, swears an oath to support the Constitution and laws of Arizona and the United States. The litigation choices made by the Attorney General are therefore dictated not only by state law, but also by this allegiance to the Constitution and her ethical duties as an attorney.

Unfortunately, the legislature has been known to pass laws that its own lawyers advise would not survive constitutional scrutiny. On occasion, the legislature has even passed laws intended to prompt litigation. Rather than change state law to require the Attorney General to defend laws even under such circumstances, I encourage the legislature to be more exacting in its deliberations to ensure fidelity to the Constitution.

The Committee on Ethics submitted the following report:

ARIZONA HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON ETHICS – JUNE 9, 2023

MR. SPEAKER,

Your Committee on Ethics ("Committee") has considered the Ethics Complaint ("Complaint") filed on May 1, 2023 (updated May 8, 2023), by Representatives Justin Heap, David Marshall, and Lupe Diaz against Representative Stephanie Stahl Hamilton. The Complaint alleges that on three separate occasions in March and April 2023, Representative Stahl Hamilton moved two Holy Bibles from their locations in the Members' Lounge and hid them under the Lounge's couch cushions and in a refrigerator in the shared Coffee Bar.

This Report summarizes the Committee's investigation and factual findings. The Committee unanimously concludes that Representative Stahl Hamilton engaged in disorderly behavior, thereby violating Rule 1 of the Rules of the Arizona House of Representatives and damaging the institutional integrity of the House.

Consistent with the text of the Arizona Constitution, *see* Ariz. Const. art. 4, part 2, § 11 (empowering the House to "punish its members for disorderly behavior"), the Committee refers this Report to the House to determine what disciplinary measures, if any, should be taken.

I. BACKGROUND

The Members' Lounge is a room directly adjacent to the House Floor, which all Members and staff may access with their badges. *Ethics Hearing Video* at 16:39. The Lounge is considered a "secure place" where Members may leave their belongings while they are on the Floor, conduct meetings with each other or with visitors, or take calls. *Id.* at 17:25. Various items are displayed in the Lounge, some of which have been loaned from other organizations, including artwork from the Capitol Museum and minerals from the Mineral and Mining Museum. *Id.* at 17:39. The two Bibles in the Members' Lounge, however, are property of the House. *Id.* at 18:20. Although all staff can access the Lounge, typically only senior-level staff enter and use it. *Id.* at 16:59. Members of the public must be escorted. *Id.* at 18:50.

In the afternoon of March 23, 2023, the House Sergeant at Arms, Chuck Fitzgerald, noticed that the two Bibles that were normally on the tables in the Members' Lounge were missing from their usual locations. *Id.* at 19:20. As the Sergeant at Arms, Mr. Fitzgerald oversees the Members' Lounge and readies it before each Floor session, including ensuring that "everything is in its place." *Id.* at 19:33. Believing that someone might have walked out with the Bibles, he checked the Lobby security camera footage but did not see anything. *Id.* at 19:53. The following day, he conducted a thorough search of the Members' Lounge for the Bibles and found the books underneath the cushions of the Lounge's chairs. *Id.* at 20:20. He returned the Bibles to their usual places. *Id.* at 20:35.

Just five days later, on March 29, 2023, Mr. Fitzgerald received a report that a Bible had been found in the refrigerator located on the second-floor Coffee Bar. *Id.* at 20:40. The Bible was one from the Members' Lounge. Mr. Fitzgerald became "very concerned," returned the Bible to its usual place in the Members' Lounge, and informed the House's Chief of Staff about the incidents. *Id.* at 20:54. The Chief of Staff instructed Mr. Fitzgerald to "solve the mystery" and granted him permission to install a camera in the Members' Lounge. *Id.* at 21:41. Mr. Fitzgerald did so on April 4, 2023. *Id.* at 23:05. Throughout Mr. Fitzgerald's 5 ½ years of employment and experience at the House, he had never encountered a situation like this one. *Id.* at 16:02-16:20.

On April 10, 2023, Mr. Fitzgerald noticed that the Bibles were again missing. He checked the camera's footage and saw that at about 1:18 p.m., as Members were arriving for the Floor session, Representative Stahl Hamilton entered the Members' Lounge from the east doors, appeared to take a mint out of a jar, then took the Bible sitting on the same table and pushed it under a couch cushion. See Exhibit C. She then walked to the west side of the room and took the second Bible and similarly put it under the couch or its cushion. See *Id*.

On April 25, 2023, a portion of the camera footage was publicized by a local news outlet. *See* https://www.azfamily.com/2023/04/26/arizona-democrat-minister-lawmaker-caught-camera-hiding-bibles/.

The following day, Representative Stahl Hamilton rose for a point of personal privilege on the House Floor to "acknowledge the offense that [she] committed by [her] actions of hiding Bibles in the Members' Lounge." House Floor Session, 4/26/23 at 07:52. She stated that her intent was not to be destructive, desecrate, or offend. She further stated, "I acknowledge that a conversation about the separation of church and state should have began with a conversation, and for that, I apologize." *Id.* at 08:30. She also apologized for the offense that she caused those who were "deeply offended" by her actions. *Id.* at 09:00. Representative Stahl Hamilton characterized her actions as "playful commentary" on the separation of church and state and a peaceful protest.

II. ETHICS COMMITTEE PROCEEDINGS

Complaint and Response

On May 1, 2023, Representatives Justin Heap, David Marshall, and Lupe Diaz filed an Ethics Complaint against Representative Stahl Hamilton, then filed an Amended Complaint on May 8, 2023, which included the required notarizations that were missing from the original complaint and is the operative version of the Complaint the Ethics Committee considered. The Complaint alleges that Representative Stahl Hamilton engaged in disorderly behavior in violation of House Rule 1 and potentially both committed theft under Arizona Revised Statutes § 13–1802(A)(1) and created a hostile work environment as defined by state and federal law. The Representatives alleged that her actions demonstrated "a lack of respect for other members of the Legislature, staff, visitors, and their property, and the rule of law" and "may have caused offense to the practicing Christians in Arizona, who hold the Bible as a sacred text and expect their elected officials to uphold basic principles of respect and civility." Complaint at 5-6.

Pursuant to the House Ethics Committee Rule of Procedure 13, the Committee provided Representative Stahl Hamilton, who elected to exercise her right under Rule 15 to engage legal counsel, with an opportunity to respond to the Complaint in writing. She did so, submitting an Initial Response on May 8, 2023, and a Supplemental Response (to the Amended Complaint) on May 11, 2023. Although the Supplemental Response was submitted two days after the Chairman's deadline to respond to the Amended Complaint, the Chairman accepted the Supplemental Response and the Committee considered it.

In her Initial Response, Representative Stahl Hamilton asserted that she "is an ordained Presbyterian minister" and that "[h]er actions were a peaceful protest regarding the separation of church and state, and in response to the weaponizing of religion in politics." However, she did not provide further explanation for the proposition that the mere presence of Bibles in the Members' Lounge violates the separation of church and state or any of her constitutional rights. She further asserted that her conduct did not constitute theft because "she has the legal right to use items in the members' lounge," but she did not articulate how using a Bible is equivalent to removing Bibles from their designated locations and concealing them in a disrespectful manner. Representative Stahl Hamilton's actions made it impossible for other members to exercise their legal right to use the House's Bibles in the Members' Lounge.

Representative Stahl Hamilton also posited that "[u]nder relevant case law, it is legally impossible" for her to create a hostile work environment for other sitting Members because "she is neither an employer nor supervisor of legislators," but no case law or other legal authority was submitted to the Committee to support this contention. *Id.*

In her Supplemental Response, Representative Stahl Hamilton submitted a typed statement, which she signed and dated May 11, 2023, she "acknowledge[d] those [she] offended by [her] actions of hiding Bibles" and apologized for not having "a conversation about the separation of church and state[.]" Representative Stahl Hamilton wrote that she "recognize[d] that [her] actions could have been seen as something less than playful" and that she was sorry "for those [Members]" whom she had "deeply offended." *Id*.

Rule 15 Evidentiary Hearing

On May 25, 2023, the Committee held an evidentiary hearing open to the public and press pursuant to Rule 15 of the Committee's Rules of Procedure. In anticipation of that hearing, four exhibits were submitted for the Committee's consideration:

- A. A tweet by Representative Stahl Hamilton dated June 2, 2020, at 12:51 p.m. This was also attached as "Exhibit A" to the Complaint.
- B. Photographs of the Bibles found in the Members' Lounge couch cushion and Coffee Bar refrigerator.
- C. Security video footage, approximately five minutes in length, dated April 10, 2023, from the House Members' Lounge.
- D. Legislative Video Clip, approximately three minutes in length, dated April 1, 2021, of Representative Stahl Hamilton raising a point of personal privilege on the Floor to make religious comments in reference to the crisis at the border.

During the hearing, the Ethics Committee played the videos of Exhibits C and D. Additionally, the Committee heard testimony from Mr. Fitzgerald and Representative Heap. Representative Stahl Hamilton exercised her right to be represented by counsel and did not appear at the hearing.

Given the fact-intensive allegations in the Complaint, the Committee would have preferred to hear testimony from Representative Stahl Hamilton. Indeed, the Committee had prepared questions for Representative Stahl Hamilton relevant to this investigation. Representative Stahl Hamilton's counsel declined to substantively answer some of the Committee's questions, but instead deferred to Representative Stahl Hamilton's previous statements.

Nonetheless, the Committee made best efforts to determine the facts and deems its investigation complete and final.

III. COMMITTEE'S FINDINGS OF FACT

As the Chairman emphasized at the evidentiary hearing, the sole issue for the Committee's consideration is whether Representative Stahl Hamilton violated House Rule 1, which prohibits members from engaging in disorderly behavior. In undertaking that inquiry, the Committee makes the following factual findings, accompanied by the Committee's reasoning to support each finding.

1. THE COMMITTEE FINDS that Representative Stahl Hamilton purposely removed the Bibles from their locations within the Members' Lounge on three separate occasions.

The Bibles are property of the House. The evidence also established that the Bibles were taken from tables in the Members' Lounge each time without notice or authorization from Mr. Fitzgerald—the person responsible for overseeing the Members' Lounge and the property within it—or anyone else. *See Ethics Hearing Video* at 26:18.

Mr. Fitzgerald testified that the Members' Lounge Bibles were removed from their respective locations a total of three times in a span of two and a half weeks. The first time occurred on March 23rd, the second occurred just five days after he found and replaced the Bibles, and the third incident on April 10th was recorded on camera and shows Representative Stahl Hamilton taking the Bibles.

Although no direct or recorded evidence exists for the former two occurrences, nothing presented to the Committee refutes the allegation in the Complaint that Representative Stahl Hamilton also removed the Bibles on those two earlier occasions as well. Indeed, she has never denied being responsible for all three incidents, and none of her written or public statements have suggested that she was responsible only for the third incident that was caught on camera.

At the hearing, Representative Stahl Hamilton's counsel did not deny sole responsibility for all three occurrences on her behalf. *Ethics Hearing Video* at 1:02:50. Thus, the Committee finds that Representative Stahl Hamilton was solely responsible for repeatedly removing the House's Bibles multiple times throughout March and April 2023.

2. THE COMMITTEE FINDS that Representative Stahl Hamilton purposely concealed the Bibles in a manner that was disrespectful to other Members.

Representative Stahl Hamilton's behavior included two separate sets of actions. First, as explained above, Representative Stahl Hamilton removed the Bibles from their usual places in the Members' Lounge. Second, she then repeatedly concealed the Bibles in a disrespectful manner.

Representative Stahl Hamilton could have placed the Bibles on a bookshelf or even placed them on the Sergeant at Arms' desk after removing them from their usual places and still accomplished her stated goal. Instead, she twice decided to put the Bibles within pieces of furniture where people— including her, as seen in Exhibit C—frequently sit. Her choice was not only disrespectful to the Bible itself but was deeply offensive to those Members who revere the Bible as their holy text.

After the Bibles were returned to their usual locations the first time, Representative Stahl Hamilton then chose to place a Bible in the refrigerator—a place unusual for any book, much less one that is considered by many to be sacred. Unlike the couches in the Lounge, the refrigerator is located in a separate room. This means that Representative Stahl Hamilton made a conscious decision to place the Bible there, then took the time and affirmative steps to take the Bible into her possession and walk out of the Members' Lounge and into the Coffee Bar.

Representative Stahl Hamilton not only moved the Bibles, she treated them in a manner that was disrespectful to others, including other Members of the House.

3. THE COMMITTEE FINDS that Representative Stahl Hamilton did not fully apologize for her conduct.

Representative Stahl Hamilton wrote in her Response to the Complaint that she had "apologized for her actions," but after careful review of the verbal and written apologies, the Committee disagrees about the extent of those apologies. On the Floor, Representative Stahl Hamilton apologized for the fact that she realized that "a conversation about the separation of church and state should have begun with a conversation," and for the offense that her actions caused, but never the actions themselves. Similarly, in her written letter, Representative Stahl Hamilton again apologized "for those [Members]" whom she had offended, but again did not apologize expressly for the actions themselves. She has maintained in her public comments that her actions were justified as a "peaceful protest."

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Considering all of Representative Stahl Hamilton's statements since the incidents occurred, the Committee has not been able to conclude that her apology was complete. On one hand, the Committee recognizes that Representative Stahl Hamilton might believe that her public acknowledgement of the matter and expressing remorse sufficiently addressed it. Conversely, the Committee also recognizes that some might believe that her decision to apologize expressly for external reactions but not likewise do so for her personal actions falls short of fully taking responsibility for the behavior. To this end, the Committee again notes that it would have preferred to have heard from Representative Stahl Hamilton directly during the Ethics Committee hearing to help discern how to approach these competing inferences.

4. THE COMMITTEE FINDS that Representative Stahl Hamilton's repeated actions offended some Members of the House, violated the inherent obligation to protect the integrity of the House, and caused the House to expend resources.

As Representative Stahl Hamilton has acknowledged, her actions have deeply offended some Members of this body as well as others who revere the Bible as their holy text. Representative Stahl Hamilton intentionally placed Bibles in a refrigerator and under the cushions of chairs that are often sat upon. As presented in the Ethics Complaint and explained during Representative Heap's testimony, the latter has caused Members to struggle with the idea that a text that they consider holy and sacred has been disrespectfully sat upon, or worse, that they themselves might have unknowingly done so.

Further, by placing the Bibles in unknown locations, Representative Stahl Hamilton deprived Members who choose to exercise their religious beliefs by referring to the biblical text of any opportunity to do so during the time periods when the Bibles were missing. Indeed, Mr. Fitzgerald testified that he has seen Members read the Bibles in the Lounge, and Representative Heap testified that he has personally done so. In fact, Representative Heap even took notice once that the Bible was not available in its usual place. Importantly, the offense and disrespect displayed by Representative Stahl Hamilton's actions are not unique to the fact that the text in this case was the Bible; her actions would have been equally offensive and disrespectful if it had been the Book of Mormon, Qur'an, or any other religious text. They would have also been equally offensive and disrespectful in a venue other than the House.

Representative Stahl Hamilton and her counsel repeatedly characterized her actions as a "joke" and a "prank," but many members of this Committee do not view this as an act of jest. Further, the actions she chose to take have caused the expenditure of internal resources that should have otherwise been used to continue the people's work at the House of Representatives.

IV. CONCLUSION AND SUMMARY OF FINDINGS

The Arizona Constitution empowers the House to establish its own rules of procedure. See Ariz. Const. art. 4, part 2, § 8. The House Rules, which the House adopted at the beginning of the first regular session of the 56th Legislature, expressly confirm that House Rules are subject only to constitutional rules and take precedence over statutory rules or provisions, customs and usages, or other parliamentary authority. See House Rule 29. Accordingly, it is incumbent on the Ethics Committee to thoroughly review any Complaint by any member to determine whether a member has violated a House Rule.

The Committee's investigation required time and legislative resources. The Committee does not lightly issue this Report, but the findings herein are necessary to protect the integrity of the House and House Rules. This Report should not be construed as any comment on individuals' constitutional rights, including the rights to freely speak or peacefully protest. House Rules have long required members, the public, and the press to maintain proper decorum. Although the Committee has held meetings open to the public and press, the Complaint at issue ultimately presents an internal House matter for the Committee alone to investigate.

Pursuant to its investigation and its factual findings above, the Committee finds that the evidence sufficiently supports a conclusion that Representative Stahl Hamilton's repeated behavior, taken as a whole, constitutes disorderly behavior in violation of Rule 1 of the Arizona House of Representatives.

The Committee notes that its findings require a subjective assessment of Representative Stahl Hamilton's conduct. Accordingly, the Committee recommends that all members of the House fully examine this Report and the material cited herein. The Committee agrees, unanimously, that Representative Stahl Hamilton did violate Rule 1. Based on this finding, and because Representative Stahl Hamilton's violation of Rule 1 involves House property and took place on House property, the Committee deems it appropriate for the House as a whole to decide what disciplinary measures, if any, should be taken.

Whereas, in accordance with the findings of the Report of the Committee on Ethics, Representative Stahl Hamilton from Legislative District 21 has engaged in conduct unbecoming of a Representative, including repeatedly removing Holy Bibles that are property of the House of Representatives and concealing them under couch cushions and in a refrigerator; and

Whereas, the House of Representatives recognizes that treating any text that some consider sacred in this manner is disrespectful and offensive.

Accordingly, the Members find that Representative Stahl Hamilton's conduct violated the order and decorum necessary to complete the people's work in the State of Arizona and we condemn her behavior.

Therefore, in accordance with Article 4, Part 2, Section 11 of the Arizona Constitution, under which the House may discipline its members for disorderly behavior, as well as Section 221(b) of Mason's Legislative Manual, I move that Representative Stahl Hamilton from District 21 be censured by the House and I request a roll call vote.

Member Smith also requested a roll call vote.

Member Grantham rose to a point of Privilege of the House, substitute motion to expel.

In accordance with Article 4, Part 2, Section 11 of the Arizona Constitution, under which the House may discipline its members for disorderly behavior, I make a substitute motion that Representative Stahl Hamilton from Legislative District 21 engaged in disorderly behavior and should be expelled immediately, and a vacancy be declared, and I request a roll call vote.

Member Nguyen also requested a roll call vote.

Substitute motion by Member Salman to recess to the sound of the gavel. Failed.

Minority Report:

We oppose Senate Bill 1583 (internet sex offender website; offenses) because of the Conference Committee's insistence that this bill remain retroactive.

The current sex offender communication notification law was implemented on June 1, 1996. Any person released from incarceration on or after this date is subject to community notification and those persons convicted prior to June 1, 1996, may be subject to community notification after completion of a risk assessment by a law enforcement agency.

The Arizona sex offender risk assessment¹ that is used to rank offenders into a level one, two or three tier considers 19 questions and scores accordingly. Level one offenders are not required to be listed on the sex offender website which requires an offense risk and recidivism risk score of no more than 20 or 19 respectively. This assessment considers the number of felony convictions where a third felony conviction receives an offense risk score of 8 and a recidivism risk of 10, or nearly half of the points that disqualify an offender for lower risk. It is not difficult to imagine that out of the 14,192² offenders currently estimated to be registered sex offenders that some of them plead down from a class 6 felony to a class 1 misdemeanor with the understanding that this plea would prevent them from being listed on the online sex offender website. For these individuals, this retroactivity clause would negate the terms of their plea deal. Not only is this unconscionable but it could also become very expensive for the state to relitigate or reexamine these cases.

One of the purposes of not including level one sex offenders on the registry is to allow those deemed unlikely to reoffend to not have to be subjected to the public shame and possible harassment that could come with being listed on the website. Because of this ranking system, there is the underlying assumption among Arizonans that if someone is listed on the website, they are dangerous. The retroactivity clause could expose an offender who committed their offense decades ago but who never reoffended to now be listed on the website for all their neighbors to see.

In addition to the conceptual arguments against the retroactivity clause, there is also a tangible opposition. The Arizona Department of Public Safety (DPS) believes that the current timeline given to complete the task is not only difficult, but downright impossible. They estimate an additional 4,634 cases will need to be reviewed to see if they meet the new qualifications included in this bill, in addition to the 15-20 normal caseload. DPS has reported that because of internal staffing issues and the turnover experienced at the Arizona Attorney General's office they are seeing an increase in the normal processing of the cases. There is no way for DPS to accurately estimate how long the new unfunded requirement would take but the guess at this time is in the years category, not months. An additional six months to complete the requirement does not even scratch the surface of the time that is needed. It could be expected that DPS will rise to the occasion when given this requirement but unfortunately this is an issue where expediting the process could result in mistakenly reporting someone on the website that should not be and ruining their lives.

We have the upmost respect for the victims who are looking for this resolution but unfortunately it is our responsibility as lawmakers to balance the rights of all Arizona citizens. We are not in the business of retributive punishment for offenders, nor are we willing to retraumatize victims who may have to go through their offender's plea being questioned because the State decided to go back on their deal.

Minority Report:

SB 1518, as amended by the conference committee, adds non-germane provisions that have already been vetoed by Governor Katie Hobbs. There is no reason to add the ballot images and cast vote record provisions to a bill that garnered broad bipartisan support in both chambers.

Supporters of the conference committee amendment language claim that its provisions will increase voter confidence in our elections, but they are simply wrong. The reason voters in Arizona—and around the country—do not trust our elections process is because there has been a coordinated, sustained attack—based on lies and conspiracy theories—on our democracy. The facts are clear: our elections are safe and accurate.

Moreover, making ballot images publicly available runs the risk of destroying the secrecy of the ballots. Voters often write on their ballots, either with messages or comments or by writing in their preferred candidate. These messages or a voter's handwriting can reveal the voter's identity without their consent. Rather than require redaction to protect voter privacy, the conference committee amendment provides a waiver of liability so that the elections officials cannot be held liable for revealing voter's identity with their ballots. This is the wrong approach. Destroying voter privacy, even in one instance, is unacceptable.

Additionally, the conference committee amendment requires the secretary of state to make the ballot images and cast vote records available to the public not later than 48 hours after the county canvass. Not the statewide canvass, but the county canvass. This means that the ballot images will be publicly available before the vote has been certified. The conference committee amendment also extends the period for losing candidates to challenge the results of their election, which is likely to lead to a drastic increase in election challenges and attempts to deny certifying election results based off unverified home "audits". This timing can only be explained as an attempt to spread doubt on the election before elections officials have completed their work. If the intent of releasing the ballot images and cast vote record is to provide confidence in the process, then they should be released after the election is certified. Not at a time when those who wish to disrupt our democracy can attempt to conduct their own "audit" of the results and cry foul when their favored candidate loses.

Minority Report:

We oppose House Bill 2802 (fentanyl sales; manufacture; sentencing; testing) because of the fundamental issues with the underlying bill, which the conference committee failed to address, in addition to the problematic nature of the amendment, which is a bill that had already attempted to move through the process but was held by the sponsor. This amendment is an attempt to circumvent the process and is the worst possible use for a conference committee.

This bill mandates a mandatory presumptive minimum sentence of 10 calendar years for individuals convicted of any of the following offenses involving a single dose of fentanyl having a weight of at least two milligrams: a) possession for sale; b) possession of equipment or chemicals for the purpose of manufacture; c) manufacture; or d) transporting or importing for sale or offering to transport or import for sale. If the individual has been previously convicted of one of these offenses, the mandatory minimum sentence is increased by 5 years. By lowering the threshold for these offenses to at least two milligrams, the legislation will greatly increase the number of individual possessing or transporting a drug for sale may not know that it also contains fentanyl. The bill also largely ignores that individuals can develop a tolerance to fentanyl, increasing the number of doses a person possesses and consumes in a day, blurring the line on what law enforcement may see as possession for sale versus possession for personal use.

The amendment added to House Bill 2802 during the Conference Committee, formerly Senate Bill 1064, will further increase incarceration rates, adding an additional one year to any individual's any prison sentence if they knowingly sell or transfer fentanyl in the new "drug-free neighborhood zones," created by the amendment. This bill designates hundreds, if not tens of hundreds "drug- free neighborhood zones" across the State of Arizona, by defining the zones as an area within 300 feet of a hospital, nursing home, drug treatment center, mental and behavioral health facility or a public park and any of the accompanying grounds of such a location. It should also be noted that these areas are poorly defined and could encompass any number of uses, for instance the term, "nursing home" is not defined in the section or elsewhere in the Arizona Revised Statutes and there is an open question as to what it could include.

Both the amendment and the underlying bill, especially when combined, will increase not only the state's incarceration rates, but the amount of time that an incarcerated person is sentenced to spend in prison. Arizona's prison growth rate already exceeded that of every other western state from 2000 to 2008, and from 1979 to 2010, the state saw an increase in its prison population of 1000%. A 2010 Office of the Auditor General Performance Audit,' documented the significant growth in the prison population and the state's spending, finding that the Fiscal Year 2011 budget for Arizona Department of Corrections was \$949 million or 11.2% of the state's general fund. The audit explored alternatives to imprisonment, including expanding early release and diversion and access to non-prison alternatives such as drug treatment and home arrest.

This bill and the amendment are in stark contrast to the Legislature's recent deliberations on bills that expand alternatives which divert more nonviolent, low-risk offenders from prison or reduce their time in prison and expanding the use of non-prison alternatives for these offenders, such as home arrest.

This bill will not address the root causes of substance abuse. One thing is abundantly clear and has been shown time and time again—criminalizing drug use does not lower incarceration rates and it will not end overdose deaths.ⁱⁱ As policy makers, we should be focusing on harm reduction, things like providing drug treatment, educating about the deadly nature of fentanyl, making sure there is access to fentanyl test strips, providing emergency responders and members of the public access to Narcan which can reverse opioid overdose.ⁱⁱⁱ Legislation like House Bill 2802 also has the potential to increase the impact of these drug policies that have been long recognized to be racially motivated and have only lead to the mass incarceration of Arizona residents.^{iv}

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



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RULES OF THE ARIZONA HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES 56th LEGISLATURE 2023-2024

RULE 1

MEMBERS

A. The House may punish its members for disorderly behavior and may, with the concurrence of two-thirds of the members elected to the House, expel any member (Arizona Constitution, Article IV, Part 2, Section 11). A violation of any of the House Rules shall be deemed disorderly behavior. When a roll call vote is ordered on the floor of the House and subject to the provisions of Rules 6 and 14, members are required to vote after a reasonable time, as determined by the Chair, and may be punished for disorderly conduct if the member fails to vote after a reasonable time.

B. When any member shall be guilty of a breach of any of the Rules and Orders of the House, and the House has determined that he has so transgressed; he shall not be permitted to vote or speak, except by way of excuse for the same, until he has made satisfaction.

C. Only members may present a complaint to the Ethics Committee Chairman regarding the behavior of any member.

D. Any member having obtained leave of absence and having in his possession papers relative to business before the House shall leave same with the Chief Clerk.

RULE 2

ANNUAL SESSIONS

A. Except as provided herein, regular sessions shall be adjourned sine die no later than Saturday of the week in which the one hundredth day from the beginning of each regular session falls. The Speaker may by declaration authorize the extension of the session for a period not to exceed seven additional days. Thereafter the session can be extended only by a majority vote of the House.

B. If not considered in the regular session, the general appropriations bill, the general capital outlay bill and the university capital outlay bill may be considered each year in a special session which shall be called only for that purpose.

RULE 3

OFFICERS AND EMPLOYEES

A. The House shall elect as an officer of the House a Speaker, and shall elect a Chief Clerk and such other employees as the House directs.

B. All House employees shall be under the immediate direction of the Speaker of the House, who shall have the power to designate the person who shall be in immediate supervision of the different departments.

C. Employment, compensation and termination of personnel shall be determined by the Speaker.

D. Employees of the House are prohibited from lobbying during the term of their employment, and a violation of this Rule will be sufficient cause for the summary discharge of the offending employee.

E. No person shall be employed as a House employee who is an agent for the prosecution of any claim against the state or who is interested in such claim otherwise than as an original claimant and it shall be the duty of the Speaker to report to the House any violation of this Rule.

RULE 4

THE SPEAKER

A. The Speaker shall take the Chair at the hour to which the House shall have adjourned, immediately call the members to order, cause the roll to be called, and if a quorum be present, cause the Journal of the proceedings of the last day's sitting to be read, if requested by a majority of the members elected to the House.

B. The Speaker shall preserve order and decorum; decide all points of order subject to an appeal to the House, on which appeal no member shall speak more than once, except by permission of the House; may speak to points of order in preference to other members; and may vote in all cases.

C. The Speaker shall sign all bills, resolutions, memorials, addresses, writs, warrants and subpoenas issued by order of the House.

D. At each session the Speaker shall announce the Order of Business in conformity with Rule 7.

E. The Speaker may appoint a member as Speaker Pro Tempore to perform the duties of the Speaker. In his omission to make such appointment, the House shall proceed to elect a Speaker Pro Tempore to act during the Speaker's absence.

F. The Speaker shall have the general control of the House Chamber and the corridors, passages and committee, hearing and staff rooms of the House of Representatives and all other matters which pertain to the House of Representatives' building and related parking lots. The Speaker shall promulgate a written code of conduct and a written harassment prevention policy applicable to staff.

G. All debts incurred by the House of Representatives, either during session or between sessions of the Legislature, shall be paid by claims drawn on the Finance Division; and all claims so issued shall be signed by the Speaker.

H. The Speaker is authorized to call meetings of standing and select committees of the House during periods when the House is not in session and to approve claims for travel and subsistence incurred by members of such committees in attendance thereon, as provided by law.

I. The Speaker shall be responsible for authorizing the accounts for the pay, mileage and subsistence of members and employees, and pay them as provided by law.

J. Every bill, resolution and memorial, except death resolutions and Senate bills to be substituted on Third Reading pursuant to Rule 7(C), shall automatically be assigned to the Rules Committee at the time of assignment to another standing committee without action upon the part of the Speaker.

K. The Speaker is authorized to bring or assert in any forum on behalf of the House any claim or right arising out of any injury to the House's powers or duties under the Constitution or Laws of this state.

RULE 5

THE CHIEF CLERK

A. The Chief Clerk shall keep the Journal of the House and enter therein the record of each day's proceedings, including every question of order which shall be decided on appeal, with the decision thereon, and the hour of adjournment.

B. The Chief Clerk shall prepare copies of the Committee of the Whole Calendar and deliver the same in paper form or electronically to the members, and prepare such other memoranda as the House or Speaker may direct.

C. The Chief Clerk shall transmit to the Senate every bill or other measure, immediately after its passage, to which concurrence is necessary.

D. The Chief Clerk shall transmit all messages from the House to the Senate and Governor, unless the House shall otherwise direct, and shall perform such additional duties as may be assigned by the House or Speaker.

E. The Deputy Chief Clerk shall, in the absence of the Chief Clerk, perform the duties of the Chief Clerk.

RULE 6

ROLL CALL, QUORUM, CALL OF THE HOUSE

A. Every member shall be present within the Hall of the House during its sitting, unless excused by the Speaker prior to roll call or necessarily prevented, and shall vote on each question put, unless the member has a personal financial interest in the question, as set forth in Rule 34 or unless the member is excused from voting in accordance with Rule 14.

B. Upon every roll call the names of the members shall be called alphabetically by surnames. When members have the same or similar surnames, the designation of the district or first initial shall be added.

C. The majority of the members elected to the House shall constitute a quorum to do business; but a smaller number may meet, adjourn from day to day and compel the attendance of absent members in such manner and under such penalties as the House may prescribe. The House shall not adjourn for more than three days between the day of adjournment and the day of reconvening, nor to any place other than that in which it may be sitting, without the consent of the Senate (Arizona Constitution, Article IV, Part 2, Section 9).

D. The purpose of the Call of the House is to compel the attendance of absent members.

E. A motion or demand for a Call of the House is not debatable or amendable and may not be laid on the table, postponed, referred to committee or have other subsidiary motions applied to it, other than to recess or adjourn.

F. When no quorum is present, a Call of the House takes precedence over all other motions. Any member may raise the question of no quorum; and if a quorum is not present, the House must either order a Call of the House, recess or adjourn. The motion for a Call of the House is agreed to by a majority of those voting, but may not be ordered by fewer than 10 members including the Speaker.

G. When a quorum is present, a Call of the House ranks as a "question of privilege" and may be ordered by a majority of the members voting.

H. When a Call of the House has been ordered, the doors are closed, the Chief Clerk calls the roll of members and notes the absentees. The Sergeant at Arms shall forthwith proceed to bring in absent members until two-thirds of the members elected to the House are present, and present them at the bar of the House, whereupon the members shall be noted as present, discharged from custody, be given an opportunity to vote; and their vote shall be recorded.

RULE 7

ORDER OF BUSINESS,

SUBSTITUTION OF SENATE MEASURES FOR HOUSE MEASURES

A. The House shall convene at the call of the Speaker each day during legislative session unless a different time or day is fixed by the Body. Unless the body directs otherwise, the daily Order of Business shall be as follows:

- 1. Roll Call
- 2. Prayer
- 3. Pledge of Allegiance
- 4. Approval of the Journal
- 5. Petitions, Memorials and Remonstrances
- 6. Reports of Standing Committees
- 7. Reports of Select Committees
- 8. Business on the Speaker's Desk
- 9. Bills and Other Business from the Senate
- 10. Motions to Discharge Committees
- 11. First Reading of Bills
- 12. Second Reading of Bills
- 13. Third Reading of Bills
- 14. Unfinished Business
- 15. Committee of the Whole
- 16. Disposition of Business from Committee of the Whole
- 17. Orders of the Day

B. At any time after the reading and approval of the Journal any member may authorize a motion to be made that the House go into Committee of the Whole for the consideration of bills raising revenue or the general appropriations bill.

C. When Senate measures are received which are identical to House measures which have already been favorably reported by the Committee of the Whole, they may be substituted for such House measures on Third Reading.

D. Business shall be taken up and shall be considered only when the class to which it belongs shall be declared to be in order. Questions of privilege including introduction of guests shall be in order as provided in Rule 25(B).

E. All questions relating to the priority of business shall be decided by a majority of those voting without debate.

F. When multiple legislative sessions are held on one legislative day, the Prayer and the Pledge of Allegiance under the Order of Business in subsection A of this Rule are required to be followed only for the first session of that day.

RULE 8

BILLS, RESOLUTIONS, MEMORIALS, ENGROSSED COPIES,

AMENDMENTS

A. Every bill, resolution and memorial (hereafter "measure") shall be read by sections on three different days, unless in case of emergency, two-thirds of the House deem it expedient to dispense with this Rule. The vote on Third Reading and Final Passage of any measure shall be taken by ayes and nays on roll call. Final Passage shall be the final disposition of a bill by the House (refer to Arizona Constitution, Article IV, Part 2, Section 12).

B. Measures may be introduced by a member by presenting copies of such measure to the office of the Chief Clerk. The Chief Clerk shall have 24 hours to process such measure preceding the day of actual introduction. The name of the sponsor or sponsors shall be on the attached signature page of the measure. Introductions "by request" shall be so designated. A measure introduced in the House may be cosponsored by Senate members. A measure shall only have one prime sponsor; all others shall be designated as cosponsors. A House member's cosponsorship may be withdrawn by that member from any House measure that is in possession of the house. Cosponsorship withdrawal is irrevocable. Following an effective withdrawal of cosponsorship of the measure, the member shall not be identified as a sponsor of the House. Withdrawal of cosponsorship shall be effective if all of the following apply:

1. The member gives a written statement of withdrawal in the form prescribed by the Chief Clerk, delivering the statement to the office of the Chief Clerk and a copy to the Engrossing Clerk.

2. The measure has not been brought for a vote on Third Reading of Bills.

C. Measures may be introduced during the first 29 days of a regular session and during the first 10 days of a special session. Thereafter, with the exception of death resolutions, introduction may be allowed only with the permission of the Rules Committee. Every measure shall have one prime sponsor. A member may not be the prime sponsor of more than seven bills introduced after 5:00 p.m. on the fourth day of each regular session. For purposes of this Rule the first name on a measure shall be considered the prime sponsor.

D. Measures may be prefiled by any member-elect for introduction in the first regular session during the period following the filing of the certification of election until the first day of the regular session. Measures may be prefiled for introduction in the second regular session during the period from November 15 next preceding the second regular session until the first day of the second regular session. Measures may be prefiled for introduction in any special session during the period following the Governor's proclamation until the first day of the special session, such measures being germane to the call.

E. A measure shall be prefiled in the same manner prescribed for introduction. Measures prefiled for introduction pursuant to this Rule shall be deemed to have been actually introduced on the first day of each regular or special session.

F. Introductory sets are the sole responsibility of members of the Legislature. Members are responsible for carrying introductory sets, seeking signatures and submitting introductory sets in the Chief Clerk's office.

G. Measures accepted for introduction shall be entered in the Journal by the Chief Clerk.

H. The original of a measure shall be designated by blue backing, marked "original" and shall remain in the possession of the Chief Clerk. Copies shall be distributed as the Speaker directs.

I. All measures prepared for introduction which propose to add to the statutes or amend existing statutes shall show the proposed new language in capital letters (upper case) and the deletions shall be shown in regular type (lower case) lined through.

J. On First Reading of Bills, the measure shall be referred to the Chief Clerk for printing. The Speaker shall determine the number of measures to be duplicated.

K. On First Reading of Bills, all measures shall be referred by the Speaker or the Speaker's designee to appropriate committees. All amendments proposed by the committee shall be separately reported to the Chief Clerk's office. Each committee shall report each measure it carefully considers back to the House with such recommendations as may be deemed proper. If the Speaker designates his referral authority pursuant to this Rule to any member of the House other than the Speaker Pro Tempore the designation shall be in writing, state the period of time for which it is effective, and be filed in advance with the Chief Clerk.

L. If a measure has multiple committee assignments, the first committee must consider the measure before the second committee. If the first committee fails the measure, the measure cannot be heard by the second committee. When the first committee reports the measure to the House, the Speaker places it on the House Calendar (Inactive Calendar). When the last committee to which the measure was referred reports to the House, it is the property of the Committee on Rules, which considers the measure. The Speaker sets the order of the measures on the Active Calendar for the consideration of the Committee of the Whole.

M. The Speaker may direct that any measure be Second Read at the time of its consideration by the Committee of the Whole or on any day prior thereto.

N. When the Committee of the Whole has completed its deliberations, it is dissolved and reports to the House. By motion, the report of the Committee of the Whole is adopted by the House (or amended) and the Speaker properly assigns the House measures (or amended Senate measures) to be engrossed for Third Reading.

O. The original and two copies of each engrossed measure shall be on paper of durable quality and shall be stamped on each page thereof with the blind embossed stamp of the House. All engrossed pages not having a full complement of typed lines shall be marked from the end of the typed page to within one inch of the end of such page. The original House engrossed House measure shall have a green backing. The original House engrossed Senate measure shall have an orange backing.

P. The engrossed measure shall not be subject to amendment on Third Reading or Final Passage of the measure.

Q. The House shall provide the Senate and the Legislative Council with sufficient copies of each amended engrossed House measure on green paper with a cover page. For House amendments to Senate measures, the same number of copies shall be provided but shall consist only of those pages containing the adopted House amendments and cover page. For unamended House measures the same number of green cover pages shall be provided stating that the measure passed as introduced, which will be identical to the original and printed copies.

R. All measures and engrossed measures shall be line-numbered, and such numbering shall begin with the enacting clause. Uniform sized paper, $8-1/2" \times 11"$, shall be used. All paper and ink used by the House for the purpose of permanent records shall be of durable quality.

S. Amendments shall have uniform headings and shall read "amendment to" and shall be in the same form as the original measure. The amendment shall refer to page and line number only and when referring to more than one line shall read "lines ... through ...". If everything after the enacting clause is stricken, the amendment shall read "strike everything after the enacting clause". All amendments shall contain the language which states "amend title to conform". Substantive floor amendments shall be printed and placed on each member's desk a reasonable time prior to Committee of the Whole unless previously distributed. Substantive proposed amendments shall be reviewed for constitutionality and approved as to proper form by House Rules Counsel or other qualified personnel designated by the Speaker.

T. No amendment to strike everything after the enacting clause and insert new material shall be in order unless notice of intent to offer such an amendment has been given by at least 5:00 p.m. on the second previous working day, excluding Saturdays, Sundays and holidays, in advance of the committee meeting at which the amendment is to be considered by electronically distributing a draft of the proposed amendment to each member of the committee and relevant support staff and posting such notice online. When notice of intent to offer a strike-everything amendment has been properly executed, a revised committee agenda that lists the title of the proposed strike-everything amendment shall be distributed and posted at the information desk and online. Following the adoption of a strike-everything amendment to a House measure in possession of the House, a House member's cosponsorship may be withdrawn upon submission of a written request from the cosponsor to the Chief Clerk prior to Third Reading.

RULE 9

COMMITTEES

A. All committees, except such as the House shall select, shall be appointed by the Speaker.

B. Standing Committees of the House shall consist of the following:

Appropriations

Commerce

Education

Government

Health & Human Services

Judiciary

Land, Agriculture & Rural Affairs

Municipal Oversight & Elections

Military Affairs & Public Safety

Natural Resources, Energy & Water

Regulatory Affairs

Rules

Transportation & Infrastructure

Ways and Means

C. Each Standing Committee shall adopt and file with the Chief Clerk's Office rules of procedure consistent with the Rules of the House and shall include the following:

1. With the exception of executive sessions ordered by a majority of the committee constituting a quorum, all committee meetings shall be open to the other members of the Legislature, the press and public so long as proper decorum is maintained.

2. All committees shall meet at regularly scheduled times and places unless cancelled with the permission of the Speaker. In the absence of the Chairman, the Vice Chairman shall preside. In the absence of both the Chairman and Vice Chairman, some other committee member designated by the Speaker shall preside.

3. The committee Chairman (presiding officer) other than the Chairman of the Committee on Rules shall prepare an agenda and distribute copies to committee members, the Information Desk and the Chief Clerk's Office by 5:00 p.m. at least five days before the committee meeting. Absence of a bill, memorial or resolution from the committee agenda will prohibit its consideration unless unanimous consent of all committee members is obtained. Unless a reconsideration motion has been offered and failed, a Chairman may place a measure that failed in committee on any subsequent agenda.

4. A measure not on the committee agenda shall be scheduled for discussion at the next subsequent committee meeting by presentation of a petition containing the signatures of two-thirds or more of the committee members.

5. A roll call vote shall be taken in each standing committee when final action on any measure is voted.

6. Written committee reports shall be filed with the Chief Clerk's Office within a reasonable time but no later than two weeks from time of completion of meetings. A recording of the meeting shall be made available for public inspection three working days after the meeting. Attendance records of all committee meetings shall be filed with the Chief Clerk's Office within 24 hours from time of completion of meetings.

7. Special meetings may be called by the Chairman but require permission of the Speaker and notice to members and the general public at the Information Desk by 5:00 p.m. on the previous day, except that the notice of a special meeting of the Committee on Rules may be given in open session prior to the meeting and does not require the Speaker's permission.

D. The Speaker is authorized to call meetings of standing and select committees of the House during periods when the House is not in session and to approve claims for travel and subsistence incurred by members of such committees in attendance thereon, as provided by law. Notwithstanding the statutory authority, the Speaker, after consultation with the committee Chairman, may appoint members to the committee of reference.

E. No committee other than the Committee on Rules shall meet while the House is meeting in session without special permission of the Speaker.

F. Except as provided herein, all House measures shall be considered by committees prior to the Saturday of the week in which the sixtieth day from the beginning of each regular session falls and all Senate measures shall be considered by committees prior to the Saturday of the week in which the ninetieth day from the beginning of each regular session falls. No committee except the Rules Committee shall consider a measure in violation of this subsection without the written permission of the Speaker.

G. Notwithstanding Rule 8(T), no proposed amendment in the Committee on Rules to strike everything after the enacting clause and insert new material shall be in order.

H. All interim committee meetings shall be open to the other members of the Legislature, the press and public so long as proper decorum is maintained, with the exception of executive sessions ordered by a majority of the committee constituting a quorum.

RULE 10

REPORTS OF COMMITTEES

A. Reports of Standing Committees shall be announced to the House upon receipt of reports from the committees. Reports from the following committees concerning matters herein named shall have precedence and may be received at any time except in Committee of the Whole:

1. The Committee on Rules on joint rules, order of business and rules relating to the order of consideration of measures.

- 2. The Committee on Judiciary on the right of a member to his seat.
- 3. The Committee on Ways and Means on measures for raising revenue.
- 4. The Committee on Appropriations on all matters referred to it.
- B. When a report of a committee is printed, it shall include a minority report, if requested.

RULE 11

CALENDARS

A. There shall be the following calendars to which all business reported from committees shall be referred:

1. A House Calendar on which shall be entered all measures in the order reported from the committees, and such business as the House may directly place upon the calendar for consideration.

2. The Active Calendar of the Committee of the Whole House on which shall be entered all measures referred to the Committee of the Whole.

B. The Third Reading Consent Calendar shall be set by the Speaker and shall consist of select unamended measures reported out of all committees to which they were referred. It shall be dated, printed, placed on each member's desk or delivered electronically and posted at the Information Desk two working days prior to being accepted. Any member who wishes to protest any measure bypassing the Committee of the Whole may submit a protest in writing to the Chief Clerk's Office with a copy for the Speaker's Office during the two-day posting. This protest will automatically remove the measure from the Third Reading Consent Calendar. Subject to Rule 12(O), the measures remaining on the Third Reading Consent Calendar will then be placed on the Third Reading Calendar.

C. The COW Consent Calendar shall be set by the Speaker and shall consist of select amended measures reported out of all committees to which they were referred. It shall be dated, printed, placed on each member's desk or delivered electronically and posted at the information desk two working days prior to being accepted. Any member who wishes to protest any measure being subject to group motion and adoption of all committee amendments and instead who wishes to require that the amended measure be subject to debate in the Committee of the Whole may submit a protest in writing to the Chief Clerk's Office with a copy for the Speaker's Office during the two-day posting. This protest will automatically remove the measure from the COW Consent Calendar. Additionally, the filing of a floor amendment with the Chief Clerk will automatically remove the measure from the COW Consent Calendar. Subject to Rule 12(O), the measures remaining on the COW Consent Calendar and passed will then be placed on the Third Reading Calendar.

RULE 12

COMMITTEE OF THE WHOLE; ADDITIONAL COMMITTEE OF THE WHOLE

A. When the House shall determine to go into Committee of the Whole, the Speaker shall leave the Chair after appointing a Chairman to preside.

B. In Committee of the Whole, business shall be transacted in accordance with its priority on the Calendar, unless such priority be determined by the House before going into Committee of the Whole.

C. A majority of the members of the House shall constitute a quorum to do business in Committee of the Whole.

D. When a Committee of the Whole finds itself without a quorum, the Chairman shall direct the Sergeant at Arms to bring members to the chamber or cause the roll to be called, and thereupon the Committee shall rise and the Chairman shall report the names of the absentees to the House, and such names shall be entered in the Journal. If on such roll call a quorum shall appear, the Committee shall thereupon resume its sitting without further order of the House.

E. In Committee of the Whole the Rules of the House shall govern whenever applicable.

F. In Committee of the Whole all questions shall be decided by a majority of those voting.

G. No seconds are required to motions in Committee of the Whole.

H. In Committee of the Whole the measure shall first be read through by the Chief Clerk, unless the Committee shall otherwise order. This shall constitute Second Reading of the bill unless it has been previously Second Read. After the proper motion the measure is open to debate and amendment.

I. After a measure is moved in Committee of the Whole, the measure may be debated for a maximum of 30 minutes. After 30 minutes, the amendments are moved and explained by the sponsor or the Chair's designee and voted without debate or questions. Debate on any measure can be extended by a vote of a majority of the members present. Motions to amend the Committee of the Whole report are permitted, but explanations of votes are not.

J. When a measure is under debate in Committee of the Whole, the following recommendations are in order:

- 1. Do pass
- 2. Be recommitted to a committee for further study
- 3. Do pass as amended
- 4. Do not pass
- 5. Be retained on the Calendar
- 6. Retain its place on the Calendar
- 7. Call for the previous question

K. The following motions are not in order in Committee of the Whole:

- 1. To adjourn
- 2. Appoint, authorize or discharge committees
- 3. Lay on the table
- 4. Reconsideration

L. A roll call vote shall be taken in Committee of the Whole when a motion to recommend "DO PASS" or "DO PASS AS AMENDED" is defeated. No other roll call votes shall be taken in Committee of the Whole.

M. When the Committee of the Whole has completed its deliberations, it is dissolved and reports to the House. By motion the report of the Committee of the Whole is adopted by the House (or amended) and the Speaker properly assigns the House measures (or amended Senate measures) to be engrossed for Third Reading.

N. With the exception of committee amendments, no proposed amendment in Committee of the Whole to strike everything after the enacting clause and insert new material shall be in order and the report of the Committee of the Whole shall not be amended to circumvent this Rule.

O. Without objection, a motion to recommend that a measure do pass or do pass amended may be made in Committee of the Whole grouping together unamended measures and amended measures on the COW Consent Calendar. Upon request by any member, a measure shall be excluded from the mass motion.

P. The House may by a majority vote of those voting bring a measure otherwise designated as available for Third Reading to Committee of the Whole for amendment or further amendment, except no proposed amendment to strike everything after the enacting clause and insert new material is in order.

RULE 13

SITTING AS IN COMMITTEE OF THE WHOLE

The House may by a majority of those voting sit as in Committee of the Whole for consideration of technical changes to measures and any subject, except no proposed amendment to strike everything after the enacting clause and insert new material is in order.

RULE 14

VOTING

A. All motions may be determined by a voice vote, teller, or on request of two members by a roll call, and by declaration of the result by the Speaker or designated member; provided that the voice vote shall not apply to Third Reading and Final Passage of any measure.

B. No member shall be permitted to vote unless present in person to cast his vote.

C. No member shall vote for another, nor shall any person not a member cast a vote for a member. In addition to such penalties as may be prescribed by law, any member who shall vote or attempt to vote for another member may be punished in such manner as the House may determine. If a person not a member shall vote or attempt to vote for any member he shall be barred from the floor of the House for the remainder of the session and may be further punished in such manner as the House may deem proper, in addition to such punishment as may be prescribed by law.

D. When a roll call vote is ordered, every member who shall be within the Hall of the House shall vote, aye or nay, unless the member has filed a statement of personal financial interest in the question or is excused by the House pursuant to subsection E.

E. Subject to Rule 4(B), when a roll call vote is ordered, no member shall leave the chamber until the vote is declared. The chamber includes the floor and the Speaker's office suite. The roll will be taken once only. When a member declines to vote, the member shall be required to specify the reason. If a member declares a personal financial interest in the question and the member has failed to file a statement pursuant to Rule 34 or if the reason given is other than a personal financial interest in the question, the presiding officer shall submit the question to the House, "Shall the member be excused from voting for the reason given?" The question shall be decided without debate before the roll call vote is taken and the result is announced.

F. A member may change his vote after the roll call has been completed and before announcement of the result, but not thereafter.

G. Every member shall have the privilege of explaining his vote on substantive main motions with relevant comments (such explanation shall not exceed three minutes) and shall further be permitted to have his written explanation placed on file in the Office of the Chief Clerk and the Journal shall so show except that the provision on written explanations shall not apply in committees of the House. The privilege does not extend to incidental main motions or procedural motions; however, a member from each side may explain the rationale for the vote on such a motion for up to three minutes, the affirmative closing.

H. The Speaker or designated member shall declare all votes; but if any member doubts a voice vote prior to the declaration of the vote by the Speaker or designated member, a rising vote shall be ordered and the result declared.

RULE 15

ELECTRIC ROLL CALL SYSTEM

A. In all cases where a Rule of the House of Representatives refers to "roll call", such reference shall be understood to refer also to the "taking" of the vote by an electric roll call system.

B. When taking the ayes and nays on any question to be voted upon, the electric roll call system, so-called, may be used, and when so used shall have the same force and effect as a roll call taken as otherwise provided in these Rules.

C. When the House is ready to vote upon any question requiring a roll call, and the vote is to be taken by the electric roll call system, the Chair shall announce: "You have heard the motion" or "You have heard the ______ reading of (designating the matter to be voted upon). Those in favor will vote aye. Those opposed will vote nay. Do not vote until you hear the bell. The House will now proceed to vote."

D. When sufficient time has been allowed the members to vote, the Chair shall announce: "Have you all voted?" and after a short pause shall say: "The Clerk will now record the vote."

E. The Chief Clerk shall immediately start the recording equipment and, when completely recorded, shall present the result to the Chair, who shall announce same to the House. The Chief Clerk shall enter upon the Journal the result in the manner provided by the Rules of the House.

RULE 16

MOTION TO AMEND, GERMANENESS

A. When a motion or proposition is under consideration, a motion to amend and a motion to amend that amendment shall be in order. No amendment in the third degree shall be allowed.

B. It shall be in order to offer a further amendment by the way of a substitute amendment.

C. A motion to strike out and insert is indivisible, but a motion to strike out being lost shall neither preclude amendment nor shall a motion or proposition on a subject different from that under consideration be admitted under the color of amendment.

D. The Arizona Constitution (Article IV, Part 2, Section 13) provides in part that "every act shall embrace but one subject and matters properly connected therewith, ...". To comply with this requirement, an amendment may not expand the scope of the original measure to give it a new purpose. A measure including any amendments shall be presumed to contain one subject if:

1. The resulting measure has one general purpose and all other matters contained therein are related to that purpose or necessary to effectuate the purpose.

2. The resulting measure is a major revision of a program or agency and each of the provisions relates to the revision.

3. The measure offers only technical or conforming changes to the statutes.

4. The measure is an omnibus taxation or appropriation measure and each provision relates to the same general purpose of the measure.

5. The measure is a result of a strike everything after the enacting clause amendment and substitutes material designed to accomplish only one purpose.

E. In filling blanks, the largest sum and the longest time shall be put first.

F. Upon request of any member, and an affirmative majority vote, each amendment shall be considered separately.

RULE 17

SENATE AMENDMENTS, CONFERENCE COMMITTEES,

CONFERENCE REPORTS, FINAL PASSAGE

A. Any amendment by the Senate to any House measure shall be subject to one of the following:

1. Except as provided in paragraph 4 of this subsection, concur in Senate amendments by voice vote and Final Passage by roll call vote.

2. Refuse to concur in Senate amendments and appointment of Conference Committee (simple or free).

3. Speaker may refer the measure with the Senate amendments to a committee which after study shall recommend concurrence or nonconcurrence.

4. A Conference Committee is not required when a measure returns from the Senate and a section of law has been eliminated due to a failure to achieve a proposition 105 or proposition 108 vote threshold on Third Reading. However, the measure shall be voted on Final Passage prior to transmission to the Governor.

5. The Speaker may refer a measure that was subject to Senate amendments that introduced new material or was the subject of a strike everything amendment to a free Conference Committee that is primarily comprised of members of a standing committee that is customarily assigned similar subject matter and the measure's prime sponsor. Public testimony shall be allowed at the conference committee.

B. Any amendment by the Senate which includes the addition of the emergency clause or the requirements for enactment clause (refer to Arizona Constitution, Article IX, section 22) or a three-fourths clause to amend or supersede an initiative or a referendum or to appropriate or divert funds created by an initiative or a referendum (refer to Arizona Constitution, Article IV, Part 1, Section 1, Subsections (6) (C), (6) (D) or (14)) shall require a two-thirds vote of the members elected to the House for Final Passage with the emergency clause or the requirements for enactment clause or a three-fourths vote of the members elected to the House for Final Passage of a measure to amend or supersede an initiative or a referendum or to appropriate or divert funds created by an initiative or a referendum or to appropriate or divert funds created by an initiative or a referendum or to appropriate or divert funds created by an initiative or a referendum.

C. Conference Committees may be either simple or free. A Simple Conference Committee shall be limited to points of disagreement between the two Houses and shall not add unrelated new material, except to conform the provisions to other sections of the measure, enactments of the current session or procedural requirements. A Free Conference Committee may recommend striking amendments, compromising disagreements or inserting something entirely new except that a Free Conference Committee may not recommend striking everything after the enacting clause and inserting new material. A Free Conference Committee shall not take final action on a Free Conference Committee report to a House measure unless the measure has been heard in a public hearing of the Free Conference Committee.

D. A copy of each Conference Committee report shall be placed on each member's desk or delivered electronically a reasonable time before consideration of the report. Any member may request, and the Speaker shall grant, a one-time delay per measure of up to 24 hours prior to adoption of the Conference Committee report. Adopted conference reports and the House measures to which they pertain shall be referred for engrossing, and the bill after being engrossed shall be placed on Final Passage.

E. Except as provided herein, Conference Committees shall consider all measures prior to the Saturday of the week in which the ninety-seventh day from the beginning of each regular session falls. No Conference Committee shall meet to consider a measure after such time without the written permission of the Speaker.

RULE 18

DECORUM AND DEBATE

A. When a member desires to speak in debate or deliver any matter to the House, or make a motion, he shall rise and address himself to the Chair, and on being recognized may address the House. He shall confine himself to the question and avoid personalities. No member shall impeach or impugn motives of any other member's argument or vote.

B. When a measure is presented for consideration to the House or in Committee of the Whole, the sponsor of such measure shall be entitled to recognition to open and close the debate. In his absence another member shall be designated to open and close debate on the measure.

C. When two or more members rise, the Chair shall name the member who is to speak; but in all cases the member who shall first rise and address the Chair shall speak first.

D. No member shall interrupt another while speaking except to call to order, to correct a mistake or to move the previous question.

E. The sponsor of a measure or the designee shall have three minutes to comment at the opening and three minutes to comment at the closing of debate on an original motion or question except as further provided in this Rule. No other member shall comment more than three minutes in favor of or in opposition to any motion, question or each amendment to the motion or question except as further provided in this Rule. All comments and questions must be relevant to the motion or question.

F. A member shall have three minutes to comment at the opening and three minutes to comment at the closing of debate on any amendment proposed by the member to the original motion or question except as further provided in this Rule.

G. No member other than the member who opens and closes the debate shall comment more than once on any motion, question or each amendment to the motion or question, nor more than the time limits for speaking as provided in this Rule, unless a member desiring to speak more than once, or more than the time limits for speaking is accorded the privilege without objection or upon a motion supported by two-thirds of the members elected to the House.

H. Questions shall be confined to one minute and must be relevant to the motion or question. A member who has been asked a question shall have three minutes to respond.

RULE 19

IMPERMISSIBLE DEBATE

A. No member shall be permitted to indulge in personalities, use language personally offensive, arraign motives of members, charge deliberate misrepresentation or use language tending to hold a member of the House or Senate up to contempt.

B. If any member be called to order for words spoken in debate, the member calling him to order shall repeat the words excepted to; and they shall be taken down in writing at the Chief Clerk's desk and read aloud to the House, but he shall not be held to answer or be subject to the censure of the House therefor if further debate or other business has intervened.

C. If any member, in speaking or otherwise, transgresses the Rules of the House, the Speaker shall, or any member may call him to order, in which case he shall immediately sit down unless permitted to explain; and the House shall, if appealed to, decide the case without debate. If the decision is in favor of the member called to order, he shall be at liberty to proceed, but not otherwise; and, if the case requires it, he shall be liable to censure or such punishment as the House may deem proper.

D. There shall be no debate at the Third Reading or Final Passage of a bill except by a twothirds vote of the members elected to the House.

RULE 20

PROTEST

A. Any member shall have the right to protest and have the reasons of his protest entered in the Journal (Arizona Constitution, Article IV, Part 2, Section 16) subject to provisions of paragraph B of this Rule. All protests, whether procedural or not, shall only be in writing and shall be submitted to the Chief Clerk.

B. The protest of any member, not exceeding 200 words, may be entered in the Journal at the request of the member; but the language thereof shall impute no unworthy motive to any other House or Senate member nor transgress the Rules of the House relating to language used in debate.

RULE 21

MOTIONS

A. When a motion has been made, the Speaker shall state it or if it be in writing cause it to be read aloud by the Chief Clerk before being debated. It shall then be in possession of the House, but may be withdrawn at any time before debate begins or amendment is offered. No motion shall be recognized without the member rising and addressing the Chair.

B. All motions shall be reduced to writing, if requested by the presiding officer or by a member, and shall be entered in the Journal with the name of the member making it, and shall be read before the same shall be debated.

C. No dilatory motion shall be entertained by the Speaker or Chairman.

D. "Privileged Questions" are a class of motions which have the highest precedence.

E. When the question is under debate, no motion shall be received but:

F. These several motions shall have precedence in the foregoing order, and no motion to postpone to a time certain or to refer, being the same day at the same stage of the question decided, shall again be allowed on the motion.

RULE 22

PREVIOUS QUESTION

A. The previous question shall be put in the following form: "Those in favor of ordering the previous question will vote aye; those opposed will vote nay".

B. The motion for the previous question, when agreed to, has the effect of cutting off all debate and bringing the House to a direct vote upon pending amendments, if any, in their order, and then upon the main question, except that after the previous question has been ordered, each side shall be allowed three minutes, the affirmative closing the debate.

C. When the member entitled to speak under this Rule is absent, the member first in order upon the committee reporting the measure, who is present and joined in the report, shall have the right to occupy such time.

D. After the previous question has been ordered on the passage of a measure, one motion to recommit shall be in order. The previous question is not debatable or amendable and requires a majority of those voting.

RULE 23

RECONSIDERATION

A. When a motion has been made and carried or lost, it shall be in order for any member who voted with the prevailing side, on the same day or the next day of actual session thereafter, to move for the reconsideration thereof at a time not to exceed 14 days; and such motion shall not be amended and shall be immediately disposed of. Such motion shall take precedence of all other questions except a motion to adjourn or the consideration of a conference report.

B. The motion to reconsider is adopted by an affirmative vote of a majority of those voting, even when the vote reconsidered is on a matter that requires two-thirds or more of those voting for affirmative action. On motion to reconsider, the ayes and nays having been acted on, another motion to reconsider is not in order.

C. No measure referred to a committee shall be brought back into the House on a motion to reconsider.

D. When a report, amendment, order or measure, upon which a vote has been taken, shall have gone out of the possession of the House and has been committed to the Senate, the motion to reconsider shall be accompanied by a motion to request the Senate to return the same, which last motion shall be acted upon immediately, and if determined in the negative shall be a final disposition of the motion to reconsider.

RULE 24

DIVISION OF QUESTION

On demand of a member before the question is put, a question shall be divided if it includes propositions so distinct in substance that one being taken away, a substantive proposition shall remain.

RULE 25

PRIVILEGE OF THE HOUSE, PERSONAL PRIVILEGE

A. "Questions of Privilege" are those questions which relate to the rights and privileges of the Body or of its members in their official capacity, and should be distinguished from "privileged questions" which are a class of motions having the highest precedence pursuant to Rule 21.

B. "Questions of Privilege" shall be:

1. "Privilege of the House" which affects the rights of the House collectively, its safety, dignity and integrity of its proceedings and has the highest precedence.

2. "Personal Privilege" which relates to the rights, reputation and conduct of members individually, in their respective capacity only, and shall have precedence of all other questions except motion to adjourn and except as provided in Rule 7. Any member rising to a point of personal privilege upon being recognized shall first state the point and shall be allowed to speak for a period not to exceed three minutes. All points of personal privilege shall be made at the conclusion of the order of business, unless otherwise directed by the Speaker, but points of personal privilege to introduce guests that are confined to one minute may be made at the commencement of each day during the legislative session.

RULE 26

PETITIONS, MEMORIALS, REMONSTRANCES AND OTHER COMMUNICATIONS

A. Petitions, memorials, remonstrances or other papers submitted to the House shall be received by the Chief Clerk's office and placed on file as the final action on the petition, memorial, remonstrance or other paper.

B. Petitions, memorials, remonstrances or other papers submitted to the House may be presented by the Speaker or by a member and shall be read and considered in the order presented unless the House shall direct otherwise. The subject matter and the name of the person presenting the petition or other paper shall be endorsed thereon.

C. Messages from the Governor, reports and communications from heads of departments, or other communications to the House, and messages from the Senate, may be referred directly to appropriate committees.

RULE 27

ORDER ON THE FLOOR, PRIVILEGE OF THE FLOOR,

MAIN GALLERY, PRESS GALLERY

A. No member shall be permitted to pass unnecessarily between the Chair and the person speaking, or other persons be permitted to stand in the aisles during the session of the House.

B. Except by unanimous consent, or unless otherwise ordered by a two-thirds vote of the members elected to the House, no person except members, officers and employees of the House shall have the privilege of, or be admitted to, the floor of the House Chambers at any time; provided that the Speaker may grant the privilege of the floor, subject to revocation in any instance by order of the House, to former members of the House and to members of the Senate.

C. The main gallery shall at all times, except when the House is in Executive Session or the House or Speaker shall order the galleries cleared, be open to the public, subject to the full observance of the Rules of the House.

D. A press gallery shall be maintained, to which shall be admitted only duly accredited representatives of the press holding nontransferable cards issued by the Speaker and revocable at his discretion. The press gallery may be located on the floor of the House at the discretion of the Speaker. Any press representative desiring admission to the press gallery shall make application to the Speaker for a pass and shall accompany such application with a statement of the facts of his press connections, and with a request by the newspaper or newsgathering organization with which he is connected for such pass. Passes shall not be issued to more than four representative at a time shall occupy a seat in the press gallery if such seat is desired by the representative of any other newspaper or newsgathering organization.

RULE 28

THE JOURNAL

A. The House shall keep a Journal of its proceedings, and at the request of two members the ayes and nays on roll call on any question shall be entered (Arizona Constitution, Article IV, Part 2, Section 10).

B. Every motion made to the House and entertained by the Speaker shall be entered in the Journal with the name of the member making it, unless it be withdrawn the same day.

RULE 29

PARLIAMENTARY PRACTICE AND PRECEDENCE

The rules from the different sources take precedence in the order listed:

1. Constitutional Rules or Stipulations

2. Adopted House Rules

3. Statutory Rules or Provisions

4. Customs and Usages

5. Adopted Parliamentary Authority (Mason's Manual of Legislative Procedure, Rules of United States House of Representatives, and Jefferson's Manual)

6. General Parliamentary Law

RULE 30

EXECUTIVE SESSION

Upon a motion, carried by a majority vote of all members elected to the House, the House may resolve itself into Executive Session for the discussion of any business which may, in the opinion of the House membership, require secrecy. The Speaker may direct the chambers and galleries to be cleared, except such personnel as the Speaker may deem necessary; and during the discussion the doors shall remain closed. While in Executive Session the Rules of the House shall apply.

RULE 31

SUSPENSION OR AMENDMENT OF THE RULES

A. The House Rules may be amended upon vote of the majority of the members of the House and must include the Speaker of the House in that majority.

B. The House Rules may be suspended upon vote of the majority of the members of the House and must include the Speaker of the House in that majority.

RULE 32

AGENDAS, CALENDARS AND NOTICE OF MEETINGS

A. Agendas and calendars shall contain the number and short titles of all legislative measures to be considered.

B. A standing, interim or joint committee or a subcommittee, except the Committee on Rules, shall not take action on a measure unless the measure has been on a committee agenda which was available at the Information Desk by 5:00 p.m. on the previous day. Standing Committees are also subject to Rule 9(C). Interim committees shall prepare and distribute agendas no later than 5:00 p.m. on the second previous working day, excluding Saturday, Sundays and holidays, in advance of the committee meeting.

C. A measure not considered by the Committee of the Whole on the same legislative day as it was reported out of the last standing committee to which it is assigned, other than the Committee on Rules, shall not be considered by the Committee of the Whole unless it appeared on an active calendar of the Committee of the Whole which was available at the Information Desk on the previous day.

D. A measure not disposed of on Third Reading on the same legislative day as it was reported by the Committee of the Whole shall not be brought to a vote on Third Reading unless it appeared on a calendar available at the Information Desk on the previous day.

E. The names of the House conference appointed to a Conference Committee shall be available at the Information Desk before the conference report is signed. The report of a Conference Committee shall not be adopted unless the report was available at the Information Desk prior to the adoption.

F. In case of an emergency, a vote may be taken upon such notice as is appropriate to the circumstances. A report of the action taken in an emergency shall be available at the Information Desk within 24 hours.

G. A current report of the House action on all measures shall be available to public inspection at the Information Desk.

H. Pursuant to Article IV, Part 2, Section 8, Constitution of Arizona, the meeting notice and agenda requirements for the House, Committee of the Whole and all standing, select and joint committees and subcommittees shall be governed exclusively by these Rules.

RULE 33

CODE OF ETHICS

A. No member shall:

1. Intentionally solicit, accept or agree to accept from any source, whether directly or indirectly and whether by himself or through any other person, any personal financial benefit, including any gift for himself or another, upon an agreement or understanding that his vote, opinion, judgment, exercise of discretion or other action as a public official will thereby be influenced.

2. Disclose or use information designated by law as confidential in any manner prohibited by law.

3. Knowingly disclose or use, other than in the performance of his official duties, information gained as a result of his official position and which is not available to the general public, for his personal financial benefit or the financial benefit of any other person, including compensation from any employment, transaction or investment entered into that utilizes or is based upon such information.

4. Enter into any contract with a public agency or have an interest in the profits or benefits of a contract entered into with a public agency by any other person or entity, unless:

(a) The total gross annual income value of the contract is less than one thousand dollars,

(b) The contract is entered into by a business of which the member, his spouse or any minor child of whom the member has custody, owns or controls, individually or combined, less than ten percent thereof, or

(c) The contract has been awarded through public and competitive bidding pursuant to law, or

(d) The subject of the contract between a member and a public agency is an appointment or employment for which an exception exists pursuant to Article IV, Part 2, Section 4 or 5 of the Constitution of Arizona.

5. Appear for a fee on behalf of another person or entity before any public agency for the purpose of influencing such agency by use of threat to initiate or take an action in the discharge of his official duties that would be adverse to such agency.

B. For the purposes of this Rule:

1. A member shall be deemed to "have an interest in the profits of a contract" if the contract is entered into by the member or the member's spouse or any minor child of whom the member has legal custody.

2. "Public agency" means all courts and any department, agency, board, commission, institution or instrumentality of this state but does not include counties, cities and towns or any other political subdivision.

3. "Business" includes any corporation, partnership, joint venture, sole proprietorship, business trust, enterprise, organization, trade, occupation or profession.

4. "Gift" includes any gratuity, special discount, favor, service, economic opportunity, loan or other benefit received without lawful consideration and not provided to members of the public at large but does not include political campaign contributions if such contributions are publicly reported as required by law.

5. "Fee" includes any compensation but does not include benefits received pursuant to law as a result of being a legislator.

RULE 34

PERSONAL FINANCIAL INTEREST

A. A member who anticipates taking an action in the discharge of his official duties in which he may have a personal financial interest shall:

1. Prepare a written statement describing the matter to be acted upon and the nature of the potential interest; and

2. Deliver a copy of the statement to the Speaker, the Chairman of the Ethics Committee and the Chief Clerk. Such statement shall be retained by the Chief Clerk as a public record.

B. A member shall report a potential personal financial interest pursuant to subsection A as soon as the member is aware of such potential interest. If, however, such awareness occurs when the House is convened on the floor or during a meeting of a committee, subcommittee or caucus, a member shall report a potential personal financial interest as soon after the adjournment of that body as is practicable.

C. A member may abstain from taking any action in which he has a personal financial interest. Upon declining to participate in any legislative action on the floor, in committee or in subcommittee, the member shall state his decision and such decision shall be recorded in the Journal or minutes of that body. Prior to declining to vote in any legislative action on the floor, a member must first prepare a written statement describing the nature of the personal financial interest or the reason why the member is declining to vote and deliver the statement to the Office of the Chief Clerk and the office of the Speaker. If the member fails to file the statement prior to the member's declaration on the floor, the member shall be subject to Rule 14(E).

D. A member in doubt as to the propriety of any action proposed to be taken by him and involving a potential personal financial interest under this Rule may request the Ethics Committee to render an advisory opinion on the facts. The advisory opinion shall be issued not later than 5 days from the date of receipt of that request and be filed with the Speaker, the Chairman of the Ethics Committee and the Chief Clerk. Such opinion shall be retained by the Chief Clerk as a public record.

E. For the purposes of this Rule:

1. "An action in the discharge of his official duties" means introduction, sponsorship, debate, amendment, passage, defeat, approval, consideration or any other official action on any measure, amendment, confirmation, nomination, appointment, report or any other matter pending or proposed in a committee, subcommittee, caucus or on the floor of the House.

2. A personal financial interest exists if it is reasonably foreseeable that an action in the discharge of his official duties will have a material financial benefit or detriment either directly or indirectly on the member, his spouse or any minor child of whom he has legal custody, except that no personal financial interest exists if the legislator or such member of his household is a member of a class of persons and it reasonably appears that a majority of the total membership of that class is to be affected by such action.

RULE 35

POLITICAL PARTY CAUCUSES

All meetings of majority or minority political party caucuses of members of the House shall be open to the public except organizational meetings to elect officers of the caucus and the House and meetings to discuss matters, including those permitted in executive session as set forth in A.R.S. section 38-431.03. Each caucus shall establish procedures for convening political party caucuses.

RULE 36

DISCHARGE OF COMMITTEES

Notwithstanding any other provision of these Rules to the contrary:

1. Every measure shall be referred to one or more standing committees, except death resolutions and Senate bills to be substituted on Third Reading pursuant to Rule 7(C).

2. Except as provided in paragraph 3, if three-fifths or more of the members of the House sign a petition to discharge all committees from further consideration of a measure the measure shall be placed on an Active Calendar of the Committee of the Whole within one week unless the House adjourns sine die. If the measure is reported favorably by the Committee of the Whole it shall be brought for Third Reading.

3. If three-fifths or more of the members of the House sign a removal request, a measure shall, irrespective of the measure's status, be removed from the possession of the Rules committee and shall be placed on an Active Calendar of the Committee of the Whole within one week unless the House adjourns sine die.

RULE 37

CODE OF CONDUCT

A. The House shall have a written code of conduct applicable to members. This code of conduct shall be adopted, and may be amended, upon vote of the majority of the members of the House.

B. The House shall have a written harassment prevention policy applicable to member behavior. This policy shall be adopted, and may be amended, upon vote of the majority of the members of the House.

RULE 38

PROCEDURE ON RECORDS RETENTION AND DESTRUCTION SCHEDULE

A. Definitions. In this Rule the following definitions apply:

1. "Bill file" means a file containing materials relating to legislation as determined by the Chief Clerk.

2. "Custodian" means any legislator, legislative staff member, legislative intern or legislative contractor who has primary custody and control over a record.

3. "Personnel records" means an employee's official record and documentation of the employee's employment.

4. "Record" means all books, papers, maps, photographs or other documentary materials, regardless of physical form or characteristics, including prints or copies of such items produced or reproduced on film or electronic media, made or received in pursuance of law or in connection with the transaction of public or legislative business and over which the custodian has custody and control and that is preserved or appropriate for preservation by the House as evidence of the organization, functions, policies, decisions, procedures, operations or other activities of the custodian, or because of the informational and historical value of data contained in the record.

5. "Reference value" means administrative, legal, fiscal, research or historical value as reasonably determined by the custodian.

6. "State Library, Archives and Public Records (LAPR)" means the division of the Arizona Secretary of State that is the archives for Arizona state government, which is mandated by law to collect, preserve and make available to the public and all branches of government permanent public records, historical manuscripts, photographs and other materials that contribute to the understanding of Arizona history.

B. Authority. Arizona Constitution, Article IV, Part 2, Section 8 authorizes the Legislature to determine its own Rules of procedure which supersede any conflicting statutes.

C. General Provisions.

1. Permanent records. As set forth below, at the end of the retention period with the Legislature, the Chief Clerk or the Chief Clerk's designee must transfer to LAPR all records kept by the Chief Clerk, regardless of format, that have a retention period designated as permanent, unless otherwise instructed by LAPR. The Chief Clerk shall work with LAPR's established requirements for transfer.

2. Electronic records. At the end of the retention period set forth below, the custodian shall destroy electronic items not designated as having a retention period of permanent.

3. Paper files, records, and documents. At the end of the retention period set forth below, the Chief Clerk may destroy files that are primarily in paper format and may destroy other records, regardless of format, not designated as having a retention period of permanent.

4. No duty to migrate to new technology. The Chief Clerk is not responsible for migrating to new technology any record that is recorded in a format, such as CD and DVD, that must be read by a computer.

5. Destruction of non-permanent records. When a paper record is eligible for destruction, the custodian shall take proper precautions to destroy the entire file, record or document by shredding, burning or pulverizing it. Electronic records shall be deleted from all electronic repositories in which they reside, including servers and hard drives. The custodian may keep a list, containing minimal information, capturing any destroyed items, so that the custodian knows that it has been destroyed and has not been merely misplaced or never existed.

6. Effective date. The provisions of this Rule are applicable to files, records, and documents created before or after the adoption of this Rule.

D. Interpretation and Enforcement. The maintenance, preservation and destruction of records will be governed solely and exclusively by the provisions of this Rule. Any questions or disputes concerning the application of this Rule to any specific record or subset of records will be resolved by the Speaker, whose determination will be final. The provisions of this Rule will be enforced solely and exclusively by the House in accordance with the Rules of the Arizona House of Representatives.

E. Retention and Disposition Schedule. The following records retention periods are finite and absolute. They are not minimum retention periods or guidelines. Records may be kept beyond their designated retention periods only if they are relevant to any (1) ongoing administrative or litigation proceeding in which the House or the custodian is a party or the recipient of a third-party subpoena or (2) pending or prospective administrative or litigation proceeding in which the House or the custodian reasonably anticipates it may become a party, or if the custodian believes the record has continuing reference value.
